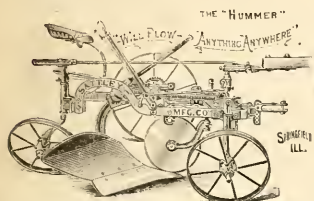

PIASA CHAUTAUQUA.

Its Charms Described by a California
Newspaper Woman.

PIASA CHAUTAUQUA, Aug. 4.—From the small boy, tickling the ear of the sleeping, cut with a straw, to the grown man, there is one trait of human nature, that seems to be common to all—that of teasing, in some manner, our fellow man. The plane on which this teasing spirit will be manifest, of course, depends upon the character and make-up of the individual, but in some way, in a greater or less degree, it finds expression in all. We do not belong to the school of apologists, but in the present case we feel it were best to state the above as an apology for this article.

In our zigzag journeys that extend all over the United States, we were able to unite the hand of business with that of pleasure, and thus secure a few days' outing at the Piasa Chautauqua. Here we have found so much that was restful, pleasing and entertaining, that the spirit of tease has urged us to use our pencil as the small boy does his straw, with the hope that we might perchance tantalize some of the many quiet stay-at-homes, until they would wake up, look around, decide they would have a summer outing, pack their trunks, check them for Chautauqua, Ill., and add to the merry crowd already at this delightful spot.

There are many things about the Piasa Chautauqua that will ever make it attractive and popular, both to the resorter and pleasure seeker and those who seek a development of the whole man, physically, mentally and morally.

The Chautauqua grounds of 310 acres in beauty, novelty and attractiveness of location could not be surpassed in the Central West.

The site selected is on the east side of the Mississippi river, on the Bluff Line, only 30 minutes run from Alton, with its 25,000 inhabitants, and an hour's journey from St. Louis, the

central hub, around which revolve all the commercial and business interests of the Mississippi valley. The railroad facilities are ample to Alton, Jerseyville and St. Louis, and from any one of these centers, connections are readily made to the Chautauqua. One of the favorite routes of travel, for those coming from northern Ill., and Chicago, is over the Ill. Central, which with its daylight specials, chair cars, obliging porters and beauty of route—the road passing through the very richest section of farming country in Ill., make the hours of travel to pass all too swiftly by, for the whole journey from start to finish, is a delightful outing.

The grounds are in every way so attractive as a summer resort, that besides the public buildings, offices, etc., there are about fifty neat cottages, and many more will be erected at no great distant day, as there is quite a good deal of talk among the summer guests about desirable lots in Peaceful Valley and the narrow ravine of Happy Land.

A source of great delight to the new comer, and substantial comfort to the old resorter, is the Piasa spring, with its cool, healthful waters and unfailling supply.

The waters are piped all over the grounds, and yet there is enough and to spare, and as "the spring hobbist" slakes his thirst, he invariably tells the new comer that the water has been analyzed and proved to be, in almost every minute particular, like the famous Eureka waters of Arkansas, and then they drink together, and once again for good health's sake.

Man's physical needs are all carefully cared for: if he has no cottage of his own he can rent right on the grounds, a very comfortable tent, and set up an independent home of his own, or secure room and board in the assembly hotel, where the uniform kind courtesy of the attendants, and the happy, friendly spirit, manifest by all the guests, make the stranger feel at home at once.

To those who enjoy out door sports,

abundant may be had in the way of hunting, fishing, boating and swimming; the fishing facilities being especially fine, in fact, more fish are actually caught in this locality than any other place in the Mississippi river between New Orleans and St. Paul.

What can one say of the scenery of Piasa Chautauqua, or what could the artist paint that would give an adequate idea of the beautiful river from the Piasa Bluffs? Climb to these commanding heights in the early morning hour, when the dew is yet sparkling in diamond splendor on leaf and flower; stand on Inspiration Point, as the mists rise from the valley and melt into blue and gold; the wide Mississippi valley stretches out before you in all the beauty and freshness of the new born day, the green, fertile fields and rich farming land of the Mississippi valley may be seen to a distance of over thirty miles. To the south is an umbrella shaped cloud of smoke, telling of the location of St. Louis and its busy toil and commercial activity; nearer to hand, nestling along the river banks are seen little villages and towns, the typical Mississippi river steamboats, ply to and fro on the river, and occasionally in the distance, as their outline is lost and only the two tall black smoke stacks are clearly outlined, one fancies for a moment that the Piasa bird has returned. Over the whole bends the blue flecked sky like an inverted lily cup, forming a scene of beauty that will remain a beauty forever to all who ever see it.

The intellectual needs of man are fully met by a most excellent Chautauqua program provided by the management, in which the very finest lectures, elocutionists and musicians of the country are secured to instruct, entertain and inspire. The committee on program spare no pains, time or expense to secure the best, and as a result, all that come to a Chautauqua entertainment feast are more than pleased.

The moral man is not neglected, an hour is set apart daily for Bible study and pentecostal service. These meetings are rich in spiritual uplift and far reaching in their blessed Christian influence.

Those who have followed us thus far, will see that the Piasa Chautauqua is splendidly equipped to meet the needs of the whole man, physically, artistically, intellectually, mentally, and spiritually.

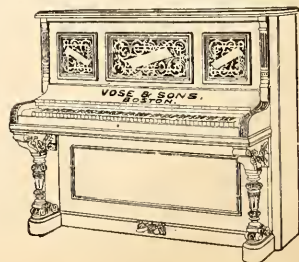
