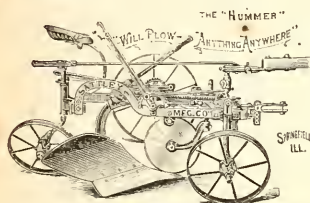

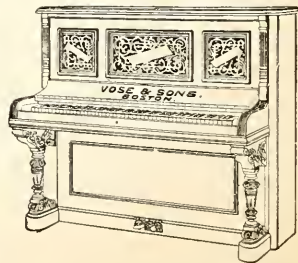

Mason of Decatur, Ill., a graduate of Princeton College, preached a powerful sermon on the "Friendship of Christ." A gentleman from Whitehall said, "I have been repaid for all my expense, by hearing this Decatur man." It was a day of growth in grace and in the knowledge of the Master.
