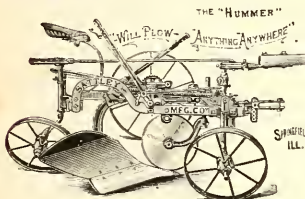

W. C. T. U. DAY.

W. C. T. U. Day is here, and the
good temperance ladies are in evidence
everywhere, as is evinced by the white
ribbon bows worn by so many, as their
symbol of purity.

At 11:00 o'clock, Mrs. S. M. James
took the chair, and a symposium was
given on various subjects, pertaining
to the prohibition of the liquor traffic.

Col. Sobieski spoke on "Total Ab-
stinence in the United States Army."
Among other good things he said,
"From my experience of ten years
that I served in the U. S. Army, I
always found that the use of alcoholic
liquors was absolutely detrimental,
and that total abstainers always made
the best soldiers. The canteen system,
ladies and gentlemen—it has been the
shame of shames that the United
States has allowed it to debauch our
boys.

The American people should make
themselves felt in this matter and say
"The canteen must go."

The next speaker introduced was
Dr. Bulkeley of Upper Alton, who up-
on his introduction said, "I feel hon-
ored that I have been called upon to
make my maiden speech upon this
subject, on prohibition, by the
ladies. I have been a prohibitionist

from the time I was twelve years old.
The liquor traffic should be prohibited,
in deference to the home. The Dr.
went on to say, (1) The work ought to
be done. (2) It can be done. (3) It
will be done.

Private Barnes of the United States
army, who is here on a furlough, was
next called upon to make some re-
marks upon the "canteen system."
He said, the canteen system is or-
ganized and carried on by the gov-
ernment. On pay day all drills are
suspended and the guard house is full,
and it takes the sober soldiers to
stand on guard.

At 2:30 a large congregation greeted
Miss Maria Brehm of Chicago. Her
address was preceded by several selec-
tions, by the inimitable duet, Prof.
Knoll and Miss McNeil.

Mrs. Dr. W. P. Button sang in a
very sweet voice, the selection, "It
was rum that spoiled my boy." This
was followed by a quartette composed
of Prof. Manners and others, whose
names we we have not at hand.

Miss Brehm's address was an able
setting forth of the main features of
the work of the W. C. T. U.

The morning pentecostal meeting is

life and warmth radiate, and vitalize
the whole atmosphere of this Assem-
bly. It is the fountain from which
the spiritual rills and rivulets of Chris-
tian influence flow, but to fructify
and refresh the whole community. It

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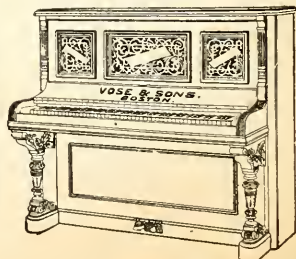
