A REMARKABLE EXHIBIT.

One That Every Farmer In Jersey County Should See.

As already announced, Farmers' Day at the Piassa Chautauqua Assembly comes on Friday, August 12th, and from present indications it will be one of the big days. The Chautauqua did a wise act when it secured Col. W. H. Fulkerson to take charge of this day and arrange the program.

The Colonel has been a member of the State Board of Agriculture for many years, and in his extensive travels and wide experience has seen and learned much. He is also a practical man and never does a thing that isn't practical. Combined with all these qualifications, the Colonel is decidedly a hustler. When he makes up his mind to do a thing or go after it, success always rewards his efforts; the word failure has no place in his vocabulary. So in addition to securing a good speaker for this occasion, he has secured a number of valuable, instructive and interesting exhibits for this day, that will afford our farmers a treat never before witnessed.

Most noted among these exhibits is that secured from P. D. Armour, of the famous Armour & Company, of Chicago, who has kindly loaned it especially for this exhibition. This exhibit is a collection of the by-products of hogs and cattle manufactured from what is commonly called offal, which, by our butchers, is thrown away. In the great packing houses competition became so close that it was necessary to utilize this waste in some commercial way, and the results obtained are marvelous. The average steer handled at Armour & Co.'s slaughter house will weigh 1150, and will dress out about 54.8 per cent gross weight, or say 630 pounds dressed beef. The remainder, consisting of hide, heads, horns, feet, heart, liver, hoofs, blood, entrails, bone, etc., is broadly known as offal, from which the various by-products are made. So with the hog and the sheep. Much of the so-called offal is used in the manufacture of animal fertilizers, and it would be interesting to write more fully of this wonderful manufacture, but as the whole process in all its details will be fully explained at the Chautauqua, a list of the principal products found in this exhibit will suffice for the present. The writer examined the following, which are mostly put up in glass bottles and jars: Powdered beef, blood albumen, raw bone meal, fluid beef extract, dried blood, bone, blood and potash, hog tankage, crude glycerine, glycerine, neatfoot oil, extract of beef, beef peptone, nutrient wine of

peptone, lard oil, soluble pepsin, essence of pepsin, 3 kinds of lactated pepsin, grain grower, 5 samples of glue, six kinds of desiccated products, pure pancreatin, prepared hair, 10 samples of wool felt, 4 samples of soap, washing powder, hoofs, sections of bone. This collection will be on exhibition Aug. 12th. Don't fail to see it.

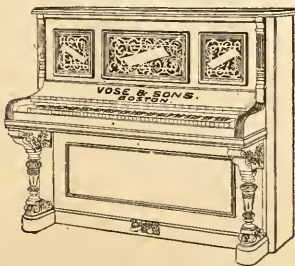
