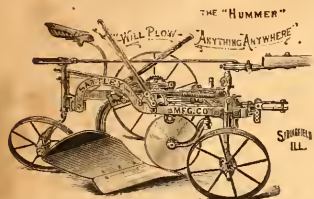

Recognition Service.

Rev. J. C. Carson, pastor of the M. E. church, Bridgeport, Ill., led the recognition service, making a short address upon the importance of each one taking some part in the service. 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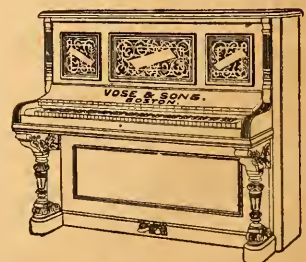
