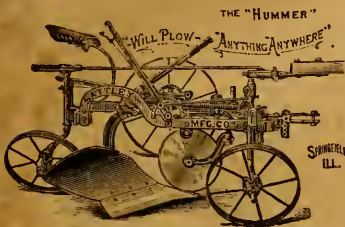

Sunday evening, Rev. Wm. Carson
of Bridgeport, gave a very interesting
sermon, on the "Kingdom of God."

Rev. Eaton delivered a very eloquent
sermon, on "Faith," Sunday morning,
and the choir sang, "Oh be joyful in
the Lord.."

James B. Moore played a piccolo
solo Saturday night. He is popular
and his playing is always enjoyed by
all who hear him. He returned to
his home Sunday evening.

Miss Marie Brehm, National Super-
intendent of the Franchise work in
the W. C. T. U., left Saturday morn-
ing for Mendon, to speak before a
representative assembly of teachers
and ministers. Miss Brehm made
many friends while here. We hope
she will be with us again next year.
In her closing address Saturday
morning, she urged the importance
of utilizing the young people's society
of the churches, in specifically tem-
perance work, the scattering of liter-
ature, and the proper observance of
the Fourth of July, and more especi-
ally complete total abstinence among
themselves.

Dr. Eaton's lecture Monday, on the
"Bible and the Stars," was very inter-
esting and instructive. Large crowds
gather every night to view the "Star-
ry Heavens," through the Doctor's
telescope.

one of the best sermons the Chautau-
quans have yet heard here. In the
evening a splendid song service, led
by Prof. Johnson, followed by a good
sermon, preached by Rev. Carson of
Bridgeport. It was a good day at
Chautauqua.

Twenty-two members of the Roman
Guards of St. Louis, came up on the
afternoon train Saturday, remaining
over Sunday, and went down on the
first train Monday morning. To say
that the boys enjoyed themselves
thoroughly, is not exaggerating. Sat-
urday afternoon was spent in bathing
at the sand bar above the grounds,
and just before supper they paraded
up and down the Assembly streets.
Sunday morning the boys scattered,
some going to Sunday school, others
to Elsie and Grafton. They had their
pictures taken in different positions;
ate watermelons and took a walk
over the bluffs in the afternoon. The
boys rose early Monday morning, and
gave their yell several times before
leaving us. One of the boys was over-
heard to say that their quartermaster
forgot three articles—pins, matches
and girls. Nevertheless several of the
boys became acquainted with some of
the Chautauqua girls, and were no-
ticed scattered over the amphitheatre
with their ladyfriends.

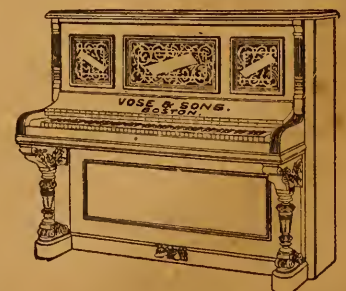
