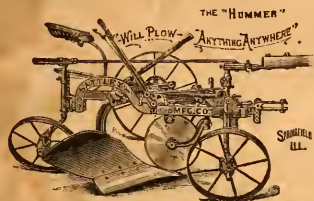

GOOD-BYE.

The Last Big Day.

Five quartettes, viz.: Alton, Bethalto, Hillsboro, Jerseyville and Lebanon, will contest for the prize. Thursday will be a great day and crowded to its fullest with good things for the multitudes who will visit the grounds.

Tuesday was C. L. S. C. recognition service. At 2 o'clock Miss Marie McNeil gave the bugle call, and the Chautauquans assembled at the well known striped tent on Jerseyville Avenue, from whence they marched, double file to the entrance of "the golden gate," through which the following persons passed, indicating that they had finished the course, viz.: Miss Ella Henderson, of Greenfield, of the Class of 1898; Mrs. Butler of Brighton, and Mrs. Jennie H. Wilkins and Mildred Edmisten of Greenfield. Among the older C. L. S. C. members in the procession, were Mrs. S. H. Bowman of Jerseyville; Mrs. J. Scaritt of Cairo; Mrs. A. W. Cross, Mrs. W. E. Carlin, Miss Mae Kirby, and Miss West, of Jerseyville; Rev. F. M. Van Treese of Alton; Rev. J. F. Corrington of St. Louis; Miss Fannie English and Mrs. M. A. Henderson, of Jersey-

ville. After recognition service and the admission of the new graduates to the "Hall in the Grove," the procession marched to the tabernacle where Dr. E. L. Eaton of DeMoin, Iowa, gave the recognition address, which was full of the most telling points, and brim full of wit and wisdom, illuminated by simile and magnificent examples of what man may become, by cultivation and sweet spiritedness.

At an organization meeting of the Chautauquans at Piasa Chautauqua, Aug. 18, 1897, the following rules of regulation were adopted:

1. The name of the organization shall be Piasa Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle.

2. The object being to encourage the C. L. S. C. idea, to maintain headquarters and erect a Hall of Philosophy at Piasa Chautauqua Assembly.

3. The members shall be graduates of the C. L. S. C., those who are pursuing the course and those who have contributed one dollar or more towards the fund for the Hall of Philosophy.

4. The officers, President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Assembly Secretary, who shall compose the Executive Committee, shall be elected annually.

5. The annual meeting and election shall be held on recognition day, or on an adjourned meeting day.

6. Special meetings to be called by two members of the Executive Committee.

7. The property of this Circle shall be entrusted to the Trustees.

8. The Trustees shall be elected one every year, after the first year, for a term of three years.

9. These rules can be amended at the annual meeting by a majority of those present.

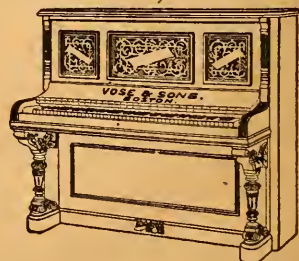
