Season tickets permit holders to go in and out as often as desired. It is the cheapest way. The entertainments cost less than 3c each to season ticket holders. There are no return checks for single admission, but it is good for all day provided one stays on the grounds.

A patrol of the grounds will be made each morning at 8 o'clock.

Children will not be allowed to sit on the front seats unless accompanied by a grown person.

In the auditorium the ladies are asked to wear their hats in their laps for the good of those behind them.

There will be a telephone, post office, bureau of information and check room. Parcels checked for 5c.

A bell will be rung announcing the programs, also a sleeping bell at 11 p. m. after which loud talking is to cease.

There will be a day and night watchman. Women and children without male escort can camp safely.

Hacks to the grounds only 10 cents.

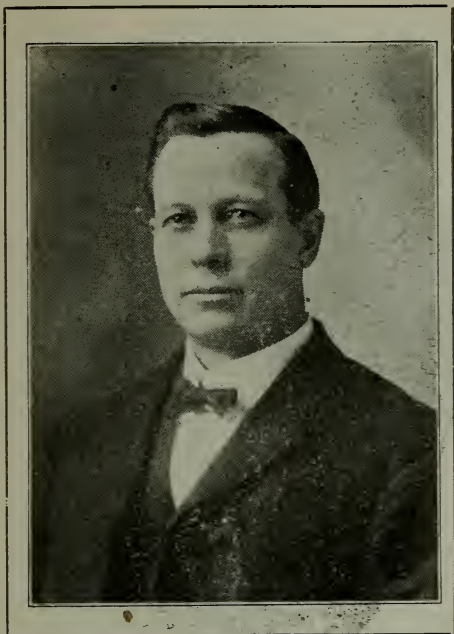

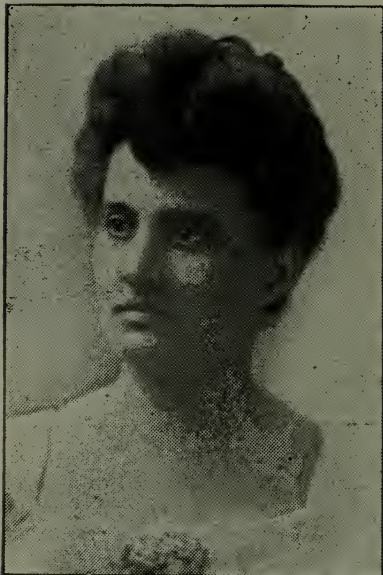
