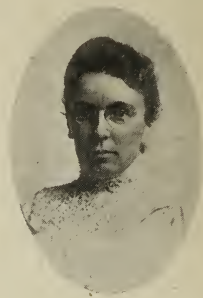

Our Assembly Music.

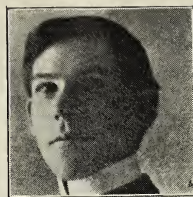

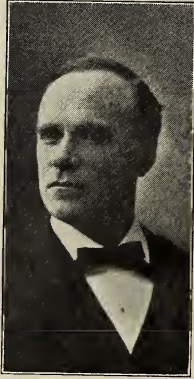
THE ORPHEUS JUBILEES.

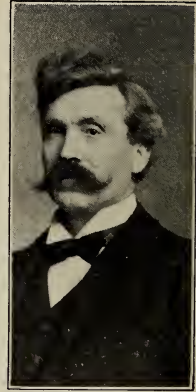

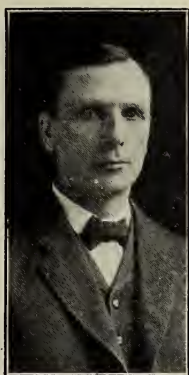
Dr. Hubbert is logical, eloquent and spiritual.

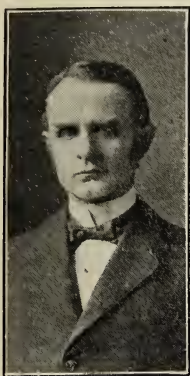

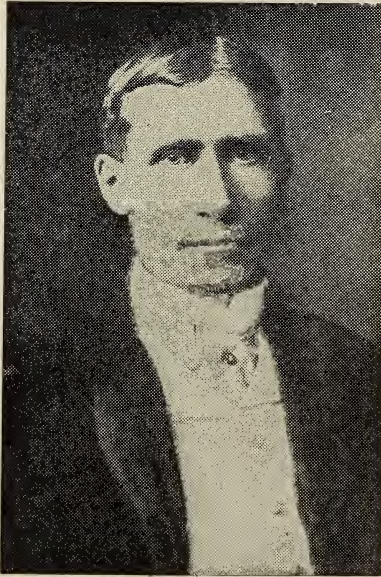

Our Afternoon Lecturers.

HON. ORVILLE F. BERRY of Carthage, Illinois, a leading lawyer of Illinois and for twenty years last past a member of the State Senate and its leader thereof, though not identified with Chautauqua platform work, has kindly consented to address an Old Salem audience on the afternoon of August 8, on "Illinois, Its Laws and Lawmakers." Senator Berry is the ideal Christian gentleman in politics. He has ever been the inveterate foe of graft and vicious legislation. His latest achievement is the passage of the Local Option Bill, which bears his name. He has a clear, penetrating voice and his speech will be a rare treat.

GOV. ALBERT B. CUMMINS—Old Salem's program of last year included Govs. Folk of Missouri and Hanly of Indiana. This year we have the pleasure of presenting two more reform governors of the great Middle West, Gov. Deneen of our own state, mention of whom is made elsewhere, and Gov. Cummins of Iowa. Gov. Cummins' rise from poverty, surmounting every obstacle that beset him, but the better fitted him to cope with the enemies of reform. Few men have paid as dearly for political preferment as has Gov. Cummins. He is in the executive chair not for his health, nor his own financial gain, but for the contribution he can make to the public weal. 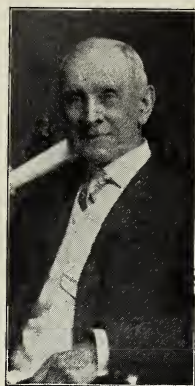
ciousness of ripe fruit, combine to make Mr. Bede one of the most popular platform speakers of the day.

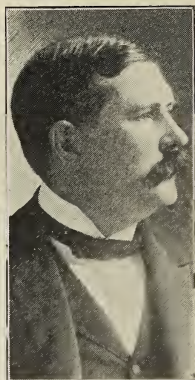

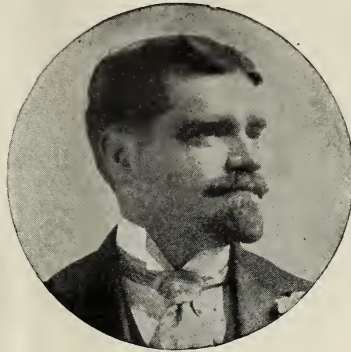

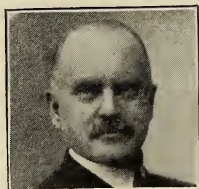
Department of Bible Study, at Brownell Hall, 8:35-9:35 a. m.

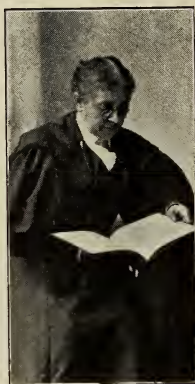

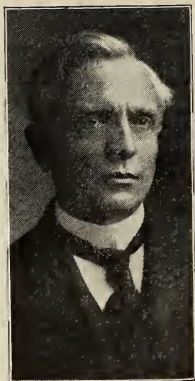

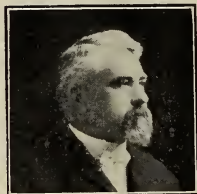
Department of the Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle, Auditorium, 9:40—10:40 a. m. daily* throughout the Assembly.

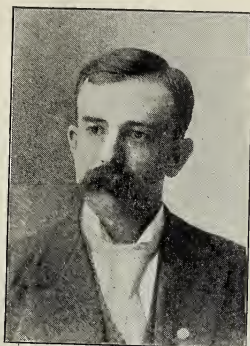

SECTION 1.—OLD SALEM'S EQUIPMENT.

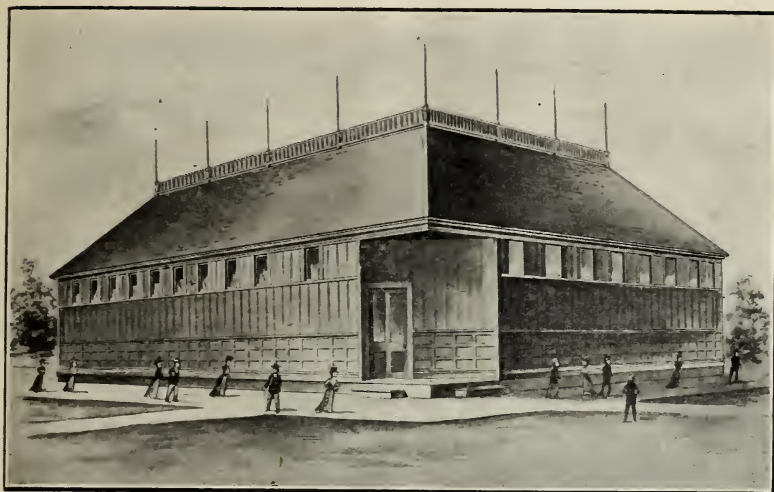

Three splendid **Class Buildings**, the Brownell Hall for Bible Study, and the Lincoln Memorial Building, supplemented this year by **Four Large Class Tents**, afford superior accommodations for our schools. **Nine Commodious Headquarters Buildings** have been erected by different churches, lodges and colleges, and add much to the working equipment of the Chautauqua by affording places for social gatherings and the many conferences which form so large a part of an assembly like ours. Its **Private System of Water-works** increases the comfort and convenience of guests by distributing pure water from our own battery of deep wells to all parts of the

The new **Athletic Field** contains a fine **Baseball Diamond**, in addition to the **Quarter Mile Cinder Track**, and all forms of field sports can be enjoyed upon it. **Dark Rooms**, with all needed conveniences, are provided for the free use of photographers, and many beautiful views await the “camera fiend.” The new and commodious **Railway Depot**, erected jointly by the Chautauqua Association and the Chicago, Peoria & St. Louis Railway Co., makes possible the rapid and safe handling of the large crowds which arrive on the suburban train. The **Old Salem Hotel**, with its comfortable rooms, affords accommodations for transient guests, and the **New Dining Hall** is equipped for furnishing good and satisfactory meal service to all. The **New Bath House** supplies a long-felt want, and is a convenience provided by no other similar institution, while the fine **Swimming Pool** will afford unbounded pleasure to all who enjoy a plunge in clear, cool water. SECTION 2.—FACILITIES FOR COMFORTABLE CAMP LIFE.

Every facility for a pleasant camp life is provided. The merchants of Petersburg have a joint store upon the grounds, in which a complete stock of groceries and supplies is available at all times, and in addition will have their representatives call upon the campers twice each day to take orders for supplies of all kinds, which will be delivered at the several camps for the prices regularly charged their town customers. Ice will be delivered upon the grounds daily, and campers will be supplied at reasonable prices. Bring a small gasoline stove with you, or rent one from the Tent Concessioner, and live in your own tent home. Or, if you prefer to secure your meals elsewhere, we unhesitatingly recommend our Dining Hall, where excellent meal service is provided at very reasonable prices.

SECTION 3.—HOW TO ARRANGE FOR CAMPING AT OLD SALEM.

First—Secure a lot or tent space. (See Sections 4 and 5, page 36.)

Second—Order your tent, tent floor and furnishings from the Baker & Lockwood Company, Kansas City, Missouri, and be sure to give your lot or tent space number correctly when you order. (See Section 6, page 36.)

Third—Ask your railroad agent if he has instructions to sell excursion tickets to Petersburg, Ill., for OLD SALEM CHAUTAUQUA, at least two or three weeks before you will want to start; and if he has not, write Superintendent J. M. Johnston immediately. (See Sections 7, 8 and 9, page 37.)

Fourth—Give your baggage checks to employes of the Williamson Bus & Baggage Line, which will have an office on the grounds. If a mistake has been made in delivery of your baggage, you can report same at that office for correction.

Fifth—Upon arrival at the Chautauqua grounds, go at once to the Bureau of Information, where all necessary information can be secured. Don't fail to register during your first visit to the Bureau of Information. (See Sections 13 and 14, page 38.)

A number of lots owned by members of the Association are listed with us for rental and may be had, ordinarily, at the rental price of \$3.00 each. Rent is payable in advance in all cases. Send money with your order. If we cannot fill your order, the money will be returned. The early orders will secure the most desirable spaces, of course; therefore, order early.

Lines of the Western and Central Passenger Associations have in the past granted a rate of two cents per mile each way for visitors to Old Salem from restricted territory. At time of going to press it is expected that the new two-cent passenger fare bill recently enacted by the Illinois State Legislature will become effective on July 1st, which will give us the usual rates from all points in Illinois.

A number of special low rate excursions will be run to the assembly. Watch the railroad advertisements for notices of same. About ten days or two weeks before you are ready to start, ask your railroad agent if he has instructions to sell excursion tickets to Petersburg on account of OLD SALEM CHAUTAUQUA, and if he has not, write to Superintendent J. M. Johnston at once, reporting the facts. He will endeavor to have the error corrected.

SECTION 9.—SUBURBAN TRAIN SERVICE.

From Petersburg, a suburban train service, making the round trip every twenty minutes, is provided by the C., P. & St. L. Railway; fare, 5c each way. This suburban train backs up within a short distance of the Chicago & Alton station, carrying passengers to and from the trains on that railway.

SECTION 10.—OLD SALEM HOTEL.

Containing lodging rooms, a dining hall and a lunch counter, conveniently located a little east of the Auditorium. The entire building will be lighted with electricity. All the departments of the hotel will be under the direct management of the Chautauqua Association, and no effort will be spared to accommodate and please its patrons. The hotel will be operated on the European plan. For prices and reservations of lodging rooms, write the Superintendent. Liberal patronage is solicited, and every dollar received over the actual operating expenses will be applied for the benefit of the Chautauqua.

SECTION 11.—DINING HALL AND LUNCH COUNTER.

These important departments will be operated by the Chautauqua Association in the new hotel building. Both dining hall and lunch counter will be well screened, comfortably seated and lighted with electricity. The Dining Hall will have a capacity for 300 guests at one sitting. Regular meals will be served here of superior quality, for 35c each. Commutation tickets, good for ten meals, will be sold for \$3.00.

The Lunch Room will be large and convenient, and the service complete and satisfactory. Service will be a la carte. Short orders can be secured for breakfast and supper.

SECTION 12.—BATH HOUSE AND SWIMMING POOL.

Another of the splendid luxuries is the Bath House and Swimming Pool—an attractive structure located on the highest hill within the

OLD SALEM CHAUTAUQUA

Chautauqua grounds. The Bath House contains twelve tubs and six shower baths, with a large number of dressing rooms. The Swimming Pool is 65 feet long, contains filtered soft water, artificially warmed, and graduated in depth from 2 to 5½ feet. The pool is completely enclosed, and the sexes will be entirely segregated. Both bathrooms and pool will be open in the morning for the use of ladies, and in the afternoon for the use of men. All necessary attendants and towels will be provided, and choice of tub, shower or plunge bath can be had for 25c. Do not omit a bathing suit from your camping equipment.

SECTION 13.—BUSINESS HEADQUARTERS AND BUREAU OF INFORMATION.

The general office of the Association will be conveniently located near the center of the grounds, and all business matters relating to the Chautauqua Association, or to the Tenth Annual Assembly, should be referred to the officers who will be found there.

SECTION 14.—PLEASE REGISTER.

All campers and visitors are requested to register at the Bureau of Information immediately upon arrival, so that they may be found in case a telegram or telephone message is received for them, and so that their friends may be directed to them. This is important; do not neglect it.

SECTION 15.—POSTOFFICE FACILITIES.

Mail addressed to Petersburg, Ill., in care of OLD SALEM CHAUTAUQUA, will be brought to the grounds twice a day, and may be received from the Assembly postoffice, which is a branch of the Petersburg postoffice, and is operated under the direction of the postmaster in charge of that office.

SECTION 16.—TELEPHONE FACILITIES.

Both Central Union and Independent long distance telephone stations are located on the grounds. Campers can arrange for a phone in their tent or cottage if they desire.

SECTION 17.—POLICE PROTECTION.

The assembly grounds are thoroughly policed night and day. No fears concerning the safety of property or the protection of person need be felt by any patron of the assembly.

SECTION 18.—FEED YARD.

A feed yard has been equipped at the southeast corner of the grounds, which will be operated by the Chautauqua Association. Good shade, plenty of water, careful attendants and remoteness from the railroad will conspire to make this necessary institution satisfactory to all. The feed yard is within the Chautauqua grounds, easy of access, and no return checks will be needed.

SECTION 19.—NOTICE TO AUTOMOBILE OWNERS.

No automobile will be allowed upon the Chautauqua grounds, nor upon the private road leading to the Chautauqua grounds. So many

teams are constantly coming and going that serious accidents might result from the presence of an automobile upon these crowded roads. Automobile parties will please leave their machines in Petersburg and come to the grounds on the suburban train.

SECTION 20.—ASSEMBLY TARIFF.

The cost of OLD SALEM'S program has doubled within the past five years, but despite this fact the same proportionately low prices of admission will prevail. The cost of a season ticket is just 16 2-3 cents per day, as in the past. Season ticket holders have their choice of nearly 450 separate and distinct exercises, at a pro rata cost of less than 2 cents each. There is no place on earth where so much is given for the price. The prices of admission are as follows:

Adult's season ticket, admitting to any and all of the Assembly exercises	\$2.50
Child's season ticket, admitting children under 12 years of age to all exercises.....	1.25
Adult's single day ticket, good for one admission to all exercises, until 11 o'clock at night.....	.25
Child's single day ticket, subject to same restrictions and good for same privileges.....	.15

Season tickets are good for entrance to the grounds at the owner's pleasure. Single day tickets are good for one entrance only, and no return checks will be issued thereon. Persons desiring to leave the grounds and return during the same day should purchase season tickets, as no other form of ticket will secure this privilege. All tickets are non-transferable, and will be taken up and cancelled and regular admission fee collected, if presented by any other person than the rightful owner.

SECTION 2 OF AN ACT FOR THE PROTECTION OF CHAUTAUQUA ASSOCIATIONS—STATUTE OF ILLINOIS. UNLAWFUL ENTRANCE PENALTY.

"That whoever, during the holding of any annual assembly of any Chautauqua Association, shall with intent to defraud any such assembly, enter or shall attempt to enter, or shall remain on the grounds or enclosure of any building within or upon which such assembly is being held, without having permission from the proper authorities thereof, or without having purchased and surrendered a ticket of admission which shall entitle him so to enter and remain, or without having complied with the published rules of such association in regard to entrance thereto, or remaining thereon, shall upon conviction be fined not less than two nor more than twenty dollars for each offense."
