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THE 1914 season at Chautauqua will begin Saturday, June 27th, which date will mark the beginning of the thirty-first annual assembly. A most cordial invitation is extended to the numberless hosts of former friends who for so many years have found health, strength, entertainment and education in this most beautiful spot.

Piasa Chautauqua is the only successful Summer Resort near St. Louis. Ideally located in a beautiful valley between magnificent, towering bluffs, with the mighty Mississippi at its front and an almost unexplored forest at its back—one of nature’s most picturesque spots, dear to many who have enjoyed its beauties.

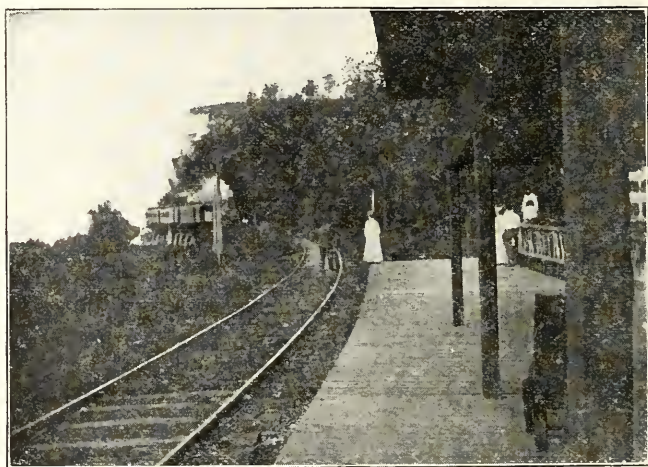
Beautiful Chautauqua—located only 38 miles from St. Louis, on the C. P. and St. L. R. R. and the Mississippi River—has, during the past years, become popular by reason of its beauty, easy access, and because the expense is less than at most summer resorts; living expenses are within the means of all who take a summer vacation.



The man who can only take a day or two from business or possibly be away over Sunday only, does not wish to devote much time and money to getting to and from his resting place, and he with the longer vacation may not care to spend all his entertainment fund in transportation. He can avoid this by coming to Piasa Chautauqua.

The business man can live at Chautauqua and be at his business during the day without loss of time or increase in living expenses.

The service by trains and boats will be as convenient as in former seasons. The trip by railroad from St. Louis is made in about two hours—by boat about four hours. The C. P. and St. L. R. R. will make a special round trip rate of \$1.35 from St. Louis, return good any time within sixty days from date

of purchase. From Granite City the rate will be \$1.15. From Alton, Ill., the rate will be 60 cents round trip. Ten ride, thirty ride and fifty-four ride tickets will be sold at special rates.

Boat rates are 25 cents and fifty cents the round trip from St. Louis, depending upon the boat. Boat passengers are allowed a short stay at Chautauqua, and many passengers utilize the time in the pool or in viewing the beauties of the Chautauqua grounds for which a nominal charge of only 10 cents is made. The Alton, Granite & St. Louis Traction Co. runs hourly trains from St. Louis and East St. Louis to Alton, Ill., at which point connection is made with the C. P. & St. L. R. R. for Chautauqua.

Chautauqua makes no pretense to exclusiveness, even though it is patronized chiefly by persons of culture and refinement who live close to nature for a while each summer and are enabled to enjoy a season of rest and quiet and thus find themselves better fitted on their return, for the daily round of home and social duties.

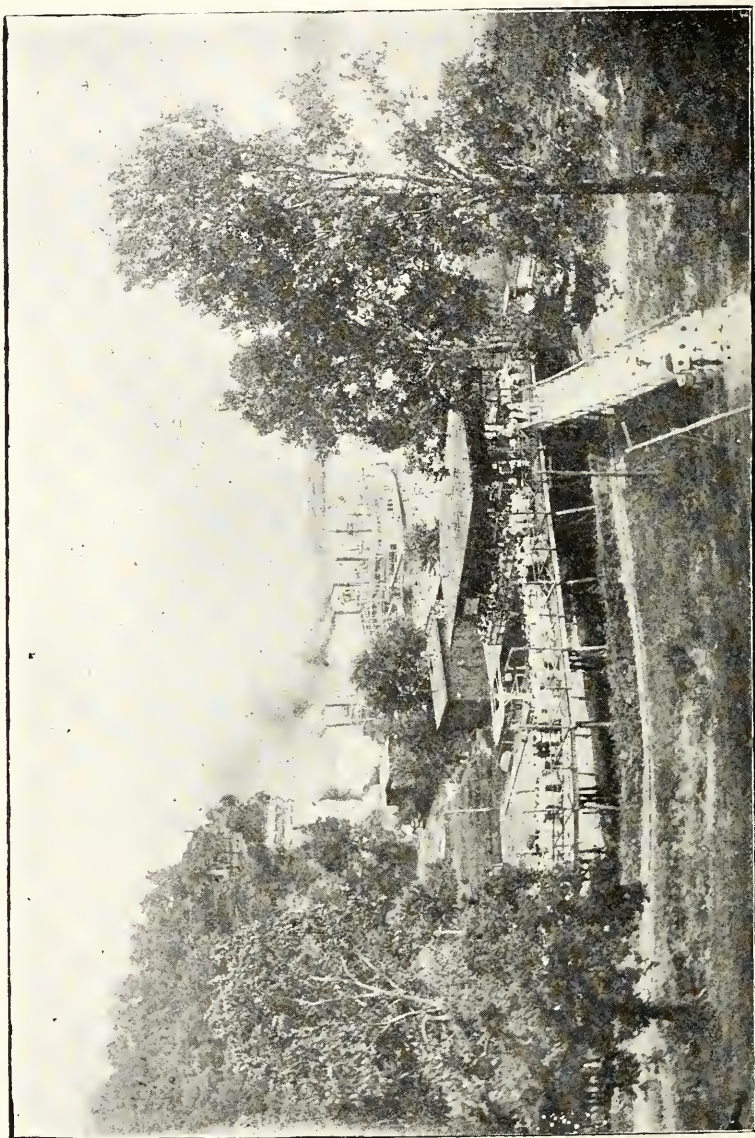
There are now 125 substantial residences in Chautauqua, many quite elaborate and more are being erected each season. A number of choice building sites are offered by the Association at very low figures. Those who contemplate building are referred to the Association office on the grounds for information.

Restful, peaceful—away from the city's busy throngs—a veritable "Peaceful Valley," where business and other worries do not enter. One cannot help but be benefited physically and mentally. 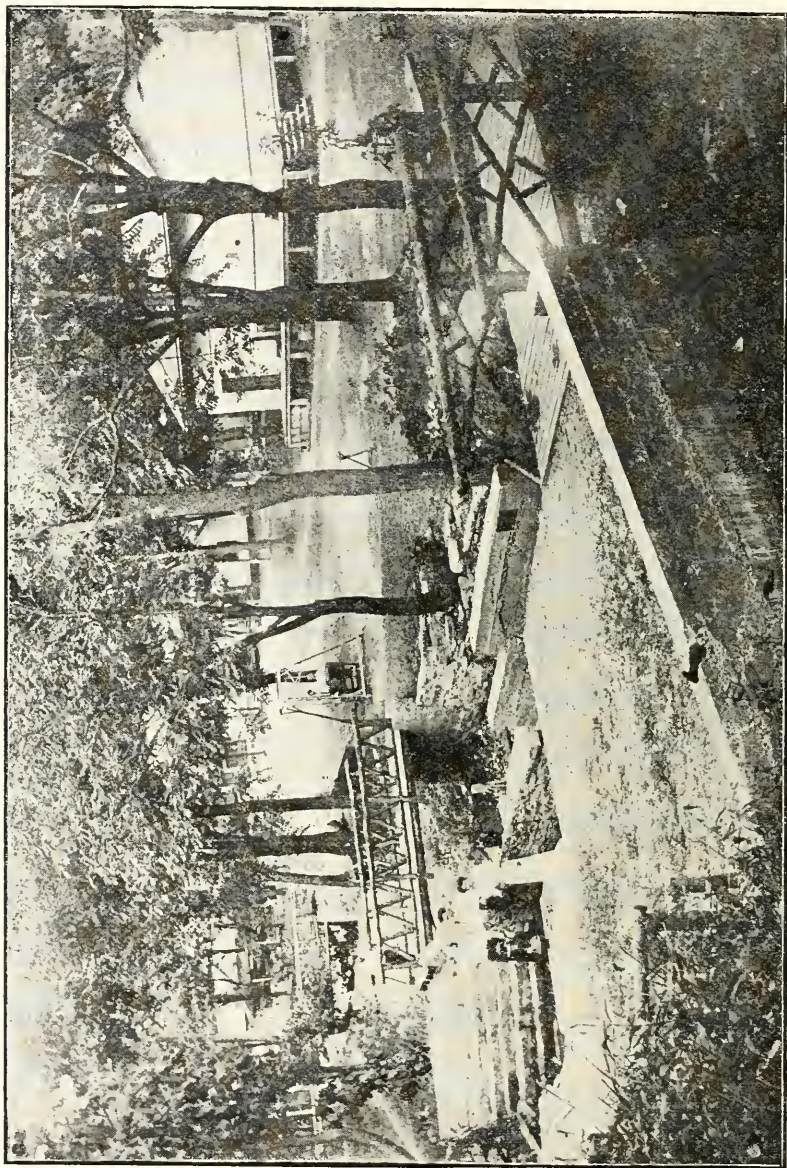
Daily deliveries of ice will be made from ice house located on the grounds.

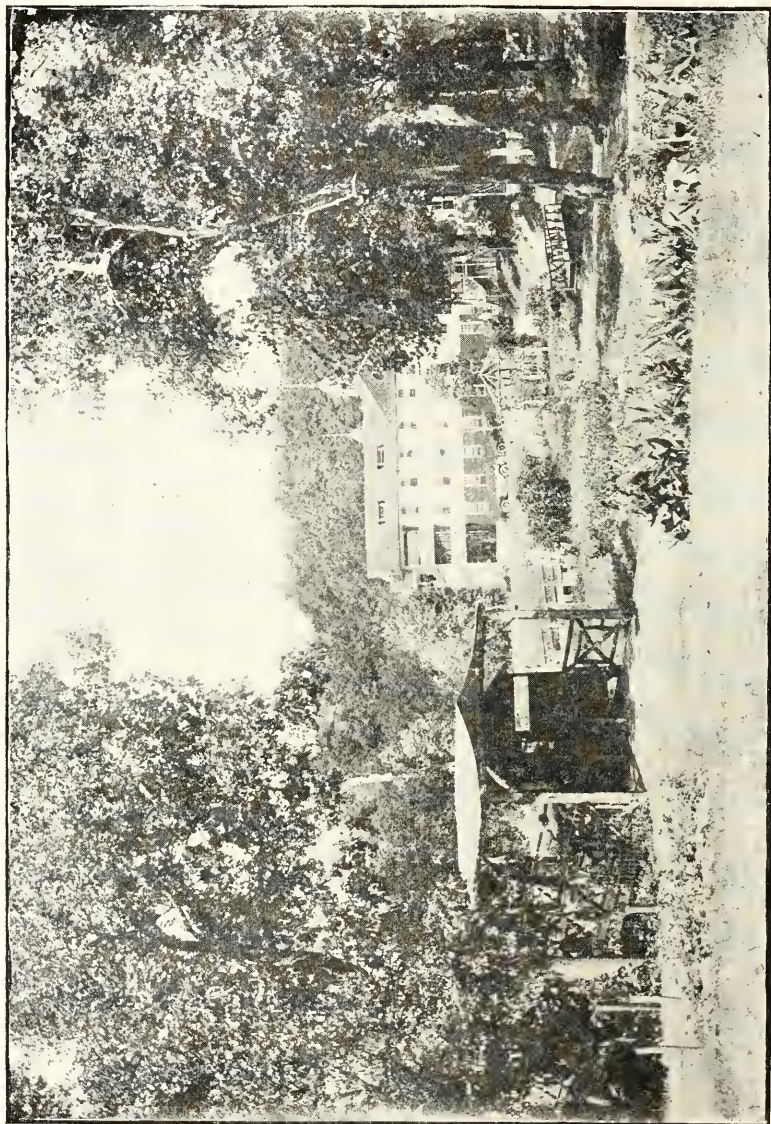

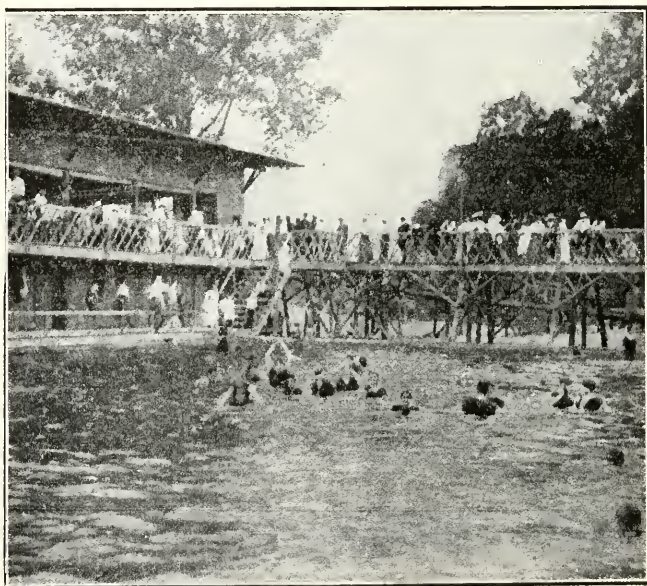


### LADIES CIVIC IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION

### **SWIMMING POOL**

Size, 75 feet wide by 175 feet long. Enjoyed by old and young daily except Sunday. The depth is graduated from two feet to eight feet. There are springing boards, swing and slide. Watching the bathers is one of the favorite pastimes of those who do not desire to take a plunge in the pool.

Depth at different points is plainly indicated by large figures, and the increase is so gradual that there is no danger for those who cannot swim, while the swimmer has room to enjoy as long a dash as is usually desired.

An expert is in constant attendance to assist those who may wish to learn to swim.

Private dressing rooms and bathing suits can be had at reasonable prices.

### **TENNIS**

The tennis courts, of which there are three, are free to cottagers and visitors. Bring your racquets with you. Special attention has been given to the tennis courts this season and each will be found in fine condition.

### **CROQUET**

There are two public croquet grounds with the necessary equipment. The use of these grounds is free to all. Croquet sets furnished free.

### **BASEBALL**

The baseball grounds are in fine shape. The athletic director will make all engagements and assist in organizing teams and arranging games. A game is scheduled for every Saturday afternoon.

### **BOATING**

Several launches are at the service of Chautauqua visitors, together with an ample equipment of row boats. There will be regular launch trips daily to Elsah and Grafton, also to any special neighborhood points that may be requested.

### **AUTOMOBILES**

Motoring to Chautauqua has become quite a fad. Parties who have made the trip for several seasons report the roads in better shape than the average country roads. Special attention has been given the road which enters Chautauqua.

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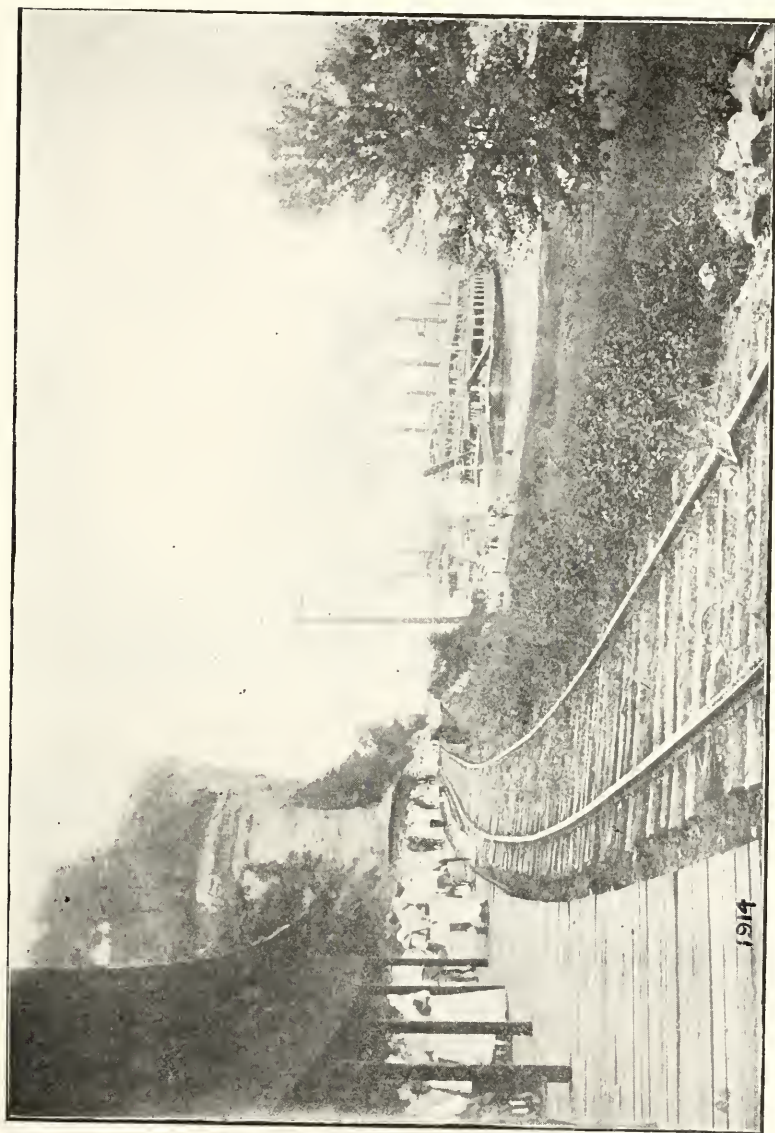
### BOY SCOUTS AT CHAUTAUQUA

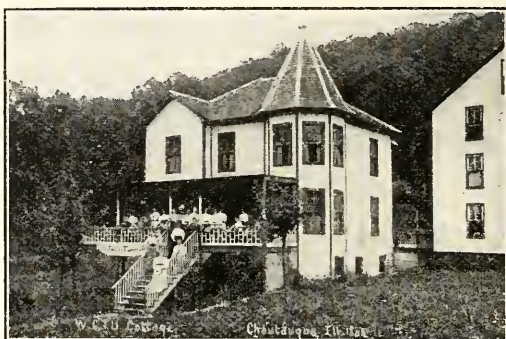

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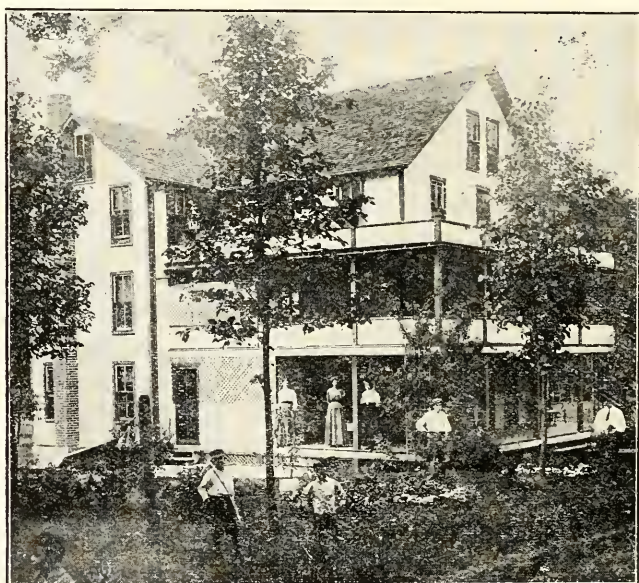

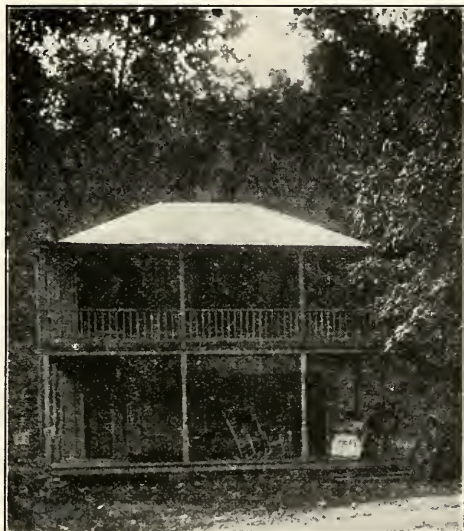
