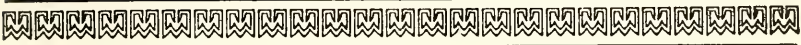

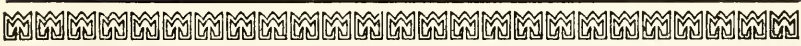

GROCERIES, MEATS, ETC.

The store is open throughout the season, and will this season be operated by Mr. Geo. H. Osborn, an experienced grocery man. All kinds of groceries, fresh and dried meats, fresh fruits and vegetables and bread and cakes can be had at prices as low as those of a city.

The neighboring gardeners supply fresh vegetables throughout the entire season. Fresh butter, milk and eggs are supplied by the farmers of the neighborhood at reasonable prices.

Daily deliveries of ice are made from the ice house located on the grounds. Two refreshment pavilions are open—one at the main entrance, and the other near the auditorium—where lunches, ice cream, fruit and confectionery are sold.

A number of cottages are for rent by the week, month or season. **Make** your reservations early. Write to the manager for particulars.

Telephone and telegraph communication can be had with all parts of the country. Mails are received and sent out three times a day, except Sunday. Have your mail addressed to Chautauqua, Ill.

THE CHILDREN.

MOTHERS' HELPER CLASSES.

The large dining hall at the Springs Hotel has been converted into a Hall of Arts and Crafts, where all kinds of fancy work will be taught.

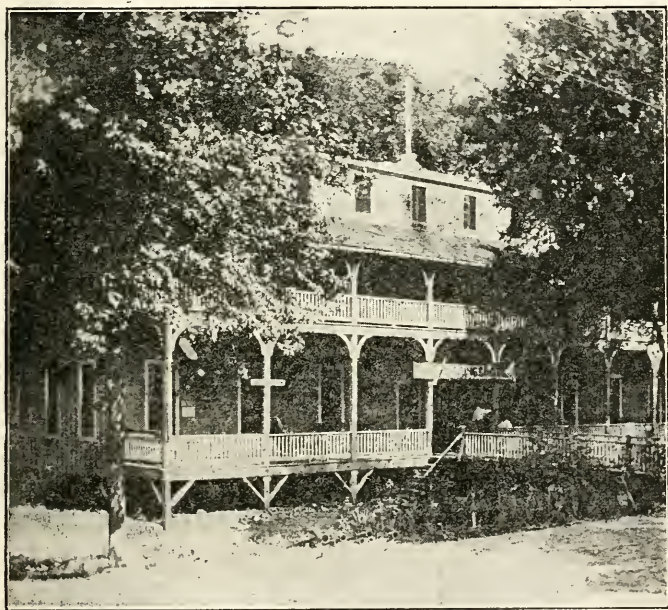
Miss Belle Patrick will have charge of the Embroidery, Smocking, and all kinds of needle work. Miss Patrick will offer prizes for best work among the girls.

PIASSA SPRINGS HOTEL.

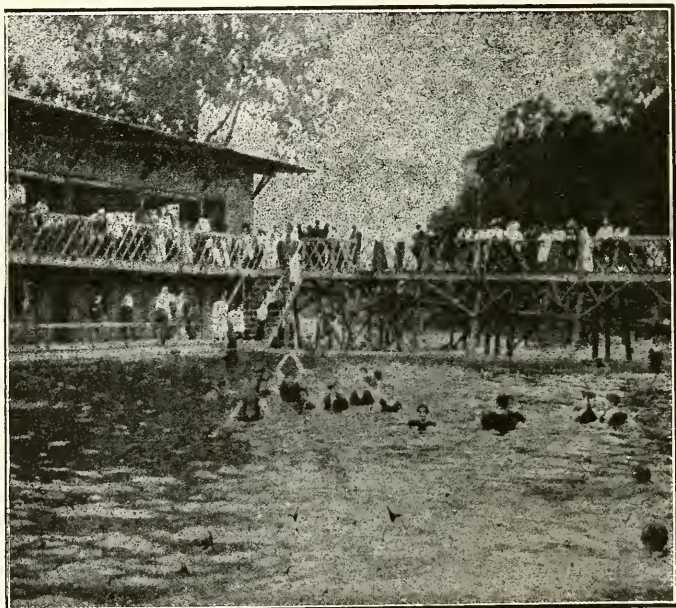
The Springs Hotel, of forty-five rooms, is under the management of the Ladies' Civic Improvement Association.

There are springing boards, swing and slide. Watching the bathers is one of the favorite pastimes of those who do not desire to take a plunge in the pool.

The depth at different points is plainly indicated by large figures, and the increase is so gradual that there is no danger for those who cannot swim, while the swimmer has room to enjoy as long a dash as is usually desired. An expert is in attendance to assist those who wish to learn to swim. Private dressing rooms and bathing suits can be had at reasonable prices.

BOATING.

There will be several launches at the services of Chautauqua visitors, together with an ample equipment of row boats. There will be regular launch trips daily to Elsau and Grafton, also to any special neighborhood points that may be requested.

TENNIS.

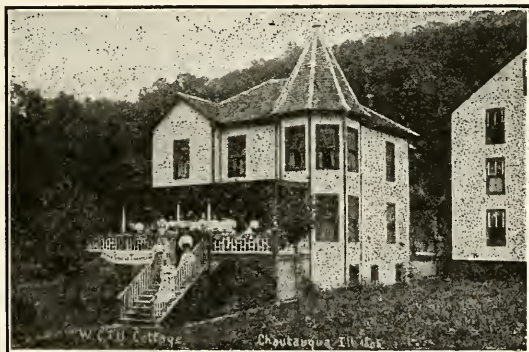
The tennis court is free to cottagers and visitors. Special attention has been given to the tennis court, and same will be found in fine condition. Bring your racquet with you.

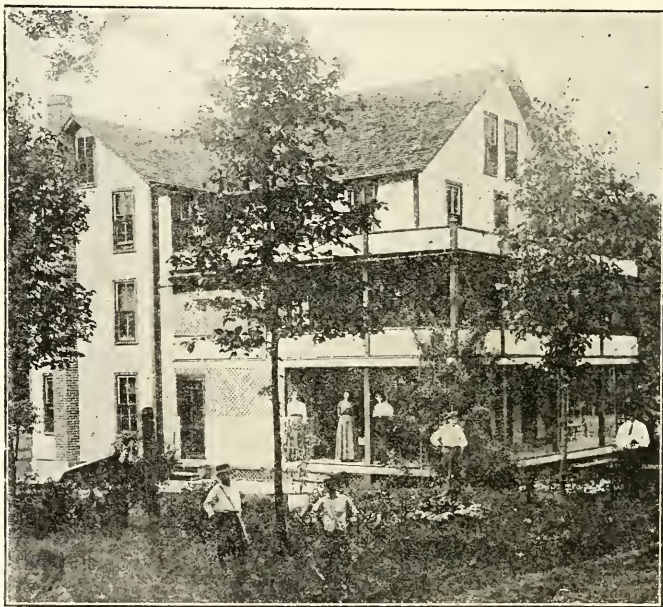

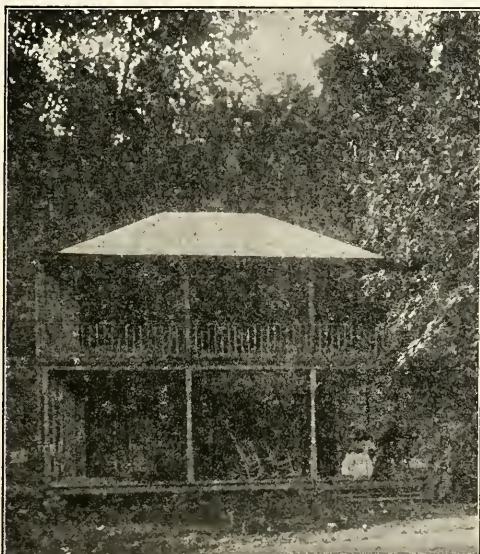

An adequate power boat and barge ferry between Chautauqua and the opposite Missouri shore will be in operation after June 15th, to handle automobile parties and their machines.
