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THE GOLF COURSE

Athletics of all kinds will be the special feature for 1919. A new nine-hole golf course has been laid out and will be ready for use early in June. It is located just north of the Inn. This will supply the one needed feature for cottage and hotel residents and guests. Only a nominal fee will be charged for the use of these links.

TENNIS, CROQUET, ETC.

The use of Tennis and Croquet grounds may be had free. Athletic contests of all kinds will be open to visitors as well as residents and handsome prizes will be awarded the winners.



THE SWIMMING POOL

The large open air concrete pool is a popular feature for those desiring safe swimming and is a source of not only much enjoyment but clean wholesome exercise for all.

The water is kept pure and clean. There are teachers to instruct and care for those who wish to learn to swim. Also guards and constant attendants to prevent accident.

A small fee is charged for clean bathing suits. Fresh water is pumped into the pool every day and the pool will be kept in first-class sanitary condition at all times.

BOATING

For the season of 1919, motor boats and rental row boats will be in charge of Captain Brock and Mr. George Fries. Motor boat trips between Chautauqua, Grafton and other points will be made daily. Moonlight motor trips can be arranged for as desired.

Patrons will find both of the above gentlemen to be experienced pilots and very accommodating and every attention will be given, to the complete satisfaction of those wishing to give boating parties on the river.

FISHING

There is plenty of fishing at Chautauqua and the vicinity. The bass and crappie fishing in the Illinois River is the finest. Fishing tackle and needed supplies can be obtained on the grounds.

CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUNDS

Chautauqua has not forgotten the children and for their pleasure has installed a small, shallow swimming pool, a slide, sand piles and swings on the Children's Playgrounds.

Benches are furnished to accommodate mothers who wish to accompany their children to the playgrounds. Complete rest and freedom from worry is afforded the mothers of children at Chautauqua, because of the fact that the fences and gatemen are so situated that the children cannot reach any point of danger but may romp over the whole grounds of Chautauqua in perfect safety.

COMMUNITY SINGING

Many Chautauquans will remember with great pleasure the singing of the big chorus of children during the Season of 1918. We will again have that chorus for the Season of 1919, with many adult voices added. Every man, woman and child is expected to take part in community Singing. All of the latest and best as well as many familiar songs will be sung this season.

PROGRAM

A nine-weeks program is made up of the most enjoyable source of entertainment, new and attractive features being given every day with the exception of Monday and Thursday are open days. The program includes lectures by the most prominent lecturers, sermons by eminent divines, music by leading concert companies, first-class motion pictures and other helpful and healthful entertainment.

In our 1919 program, we will have such talent as Lillian Johnson, Little Alice Shrode and Little Helen Hamer. Their past appearances on Chautauqua's program have been more than pleasing and they have been added to this year's program by request.

The Auditorium is located in the center of the grounds where the entertainments are given and where comfortable seats are furnished to all without charge.

THE AUTOMOBILE ROUTE

Chautauqua may be reached from St. Louis by two routes—the Illinois and the Missouri Route.

The Illinois Route from St. Louis is over McKinley Bridge through Venice, Madison and Granite City to Alton, following the Burlington trail. Following the marked poles thru Alton, arriving at the end of the street car line in North Alton. Turn to the West or left at the end of street car line and drive fourteen miles, following the Grafton Route poles to a large Chautauqua sign on the sign post at the left. Turn to the left and pass the Newbern Brick Yard and on to the Salem School House, turn South or to the left and drive 3-4 of a mile, then zig-zag, turning West or to the left and driving to the Chautauqua sign board, turn West or right and into Chautauqua.

The Missouri Route is from St. Louis to St. Charles; from St. Charles, taking the St. Charles and Alton Road past Bosehtown and Orchard Farm, striking the St. Clair and Alton Road to W. Grafton, ferry across to Grafton. From Grafton, follow the market poles back to the Chautauqua sign post, then into Chautauqua grounds, or at W. Grafton park your car at Eddington Farm then signal Chautauqua motor boat and they will carry you direct to Chautauqua.

Automobiles may be parked anywhere in Chautauqua. Mr. Emil Fischer, official Custodian, has a limited garage space for rent.

RAILWAY ROUTE

Piasa Chautauqua is situated on the C. P. & St. L. Railway, running from Alton. Connections may be made at Alton from St. Louis, by railroad or by the Alton, Granite and St. Louis Traction Company. For electric railroad fare from St. Louis, East St. Louis and Granite City, we refer you to the inside front cover of this booklet. Further information may be received by calling Bell, Bribge 2900 or Kinloch, St. Clair 1200, or the Bureau of Information at Union Station.

BAGGAGE

Baggage may be checked from Union Station St. Louis or Relay Depot, East St. Louis, direct to Chautauqua, by the Chicago and Alton, and the Chicago, Peoria and St. Louis Railway, or at Alton at the C. P. & St. L Depot.

L. C. I. A.

The Ladies Chautauqua Improvement Association, whose membership is composed of ladies on the grounds at Chautauqua, has erected this Spring a large pavilion on the river front, which will be used for social gatherings and entertainment for the benefit of the entire community. The erection of this highly ornamental addition to grounds was aided largely by the personal efforts of Mrs. S. S. Pingree and Mr. K. Kupferle. This organization has had much to do with the beautifying of the grounds and their work for 1919 will surpass any of their previous efforts.

THE INN

This popular hotel having over 300 rooms, many with bath, will be under the management of Mr. H. T. Dudley during the season of 1919. 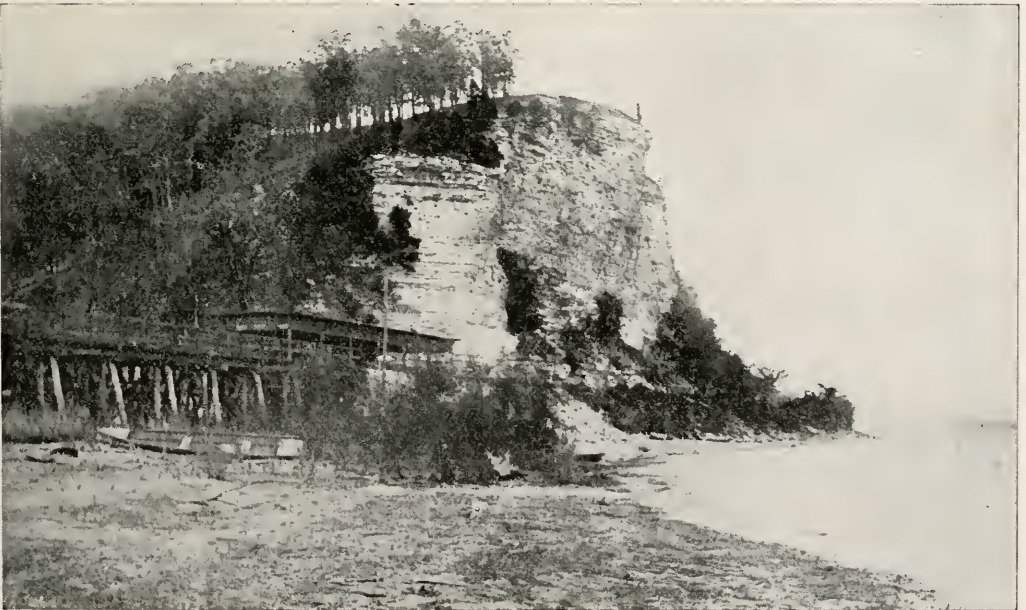

NEW PIASA CHAUTAUQUA

Program of Athletic Tournaments, Season 1919

GOLF. Two tournaments, one for gentlemen on Saturday, July 26, and continuing on the five Saturdays of August; one for ladies on Monday, July 21, and continuing on Monday, July 28, and the four Mondays in August.

ROQUE. Four tournaments, one for gentlemen on Saturday, July 26, and continuing through the five Saturdays in August; one for ladies on Tuesdays, July 22 and July 29, and four Tuesdays in August for young men 18 or under on Wednesdays, July 23 and 30 and four Wednesdays in August; for young ladies 18 or under, Friday, July 25, and five Fridays in August.

TENNIS. Two tournaments, one for ladies and gentlemen over 18 on Saturday, July 26, and five Saturdays in August; one for girls and boys 18 or under on Thursdays, July 24 and 31, and four Thursdays in August.

QUOITS. Two tournaments, one for persons over 18 on Saturday, July 26 and five Saturdays in August; one for persons 18 or under on Friday, July 25, and five Fridays in August.

SWIMMING. Two tournaments, one for men and boys, and one for ladies and girls, both classes on the afternoons of Saturday, July 26, and the five Saturdays in August.

CHAUTAUQUA HIKE. A route to be laid out through the woods and over the hills, including the tops of the bluffs on the east and west, with views of the river, of the islands and of the Missouri Shore. Total distance of hike about five miles.

PRIZES

Suitable prizes to be awarded the winners in the twelve tournaments and to the person covering the entire route of the Chautauqua Hike the greatest number of times during the season. To second highest in the tournaments and hike a season ticket for the Season of 1920.

ASSISTANT DIRECTORS OF ATHLETICS

The director of Athletics to appoint 12 Assistant Directors and one Superintendent of Chautauqua Hike. This will place one Assistant Director in charge of each of the 12 tournaments. Assistant Directors to have full charge of his or her tournament, act as umpire, to interpret rules, and decide all questions between players. They to appoint in turn such assistants to themselves as may be necessary to insure presence of an assistant Director at each contest. Assistant Directors not to be barred from entering tournaments, but when playing shall designate some other person to act as umpire. Each Assistant Director, with the approval of the Director of Athletics, to select the prizes to be awarded, in the tournament under his or her charge.

RULES

Rules for the government of all tournaments will be prepared and will include provision by which, where cumulative scores are involved, persons entering after first tournament date will be given average of scores on previous tournament dates.
