RULES FOR CHAUTAUQUA DURING 1923

PIN THIS IN A CONSPICUOUS PLACE.

1. Cottage rents MUST be paid in advance at the office.
2. No joy riding over the Chautauqua grounds.
3. Wear covering over bathing suits through the ground.
4. Throw paper in the barrels. It helps sanitation.
5. No fowls allowed to run loose.
6. Garbage must be kept in piles. This is important.
7. No athletics during Sunday forenoon.
8. Be sure to use sanitary precautions in toilet rooms.
9. Laundry must be taken in before 1:00 o'clock P. M.
10. Persons renting cottages will be held responsible for damage done to cottage or furniture.
11. No smoking in the main auditorium.
12. Children must not play around the springs.
13. No flowers must be taken from the Chautauqua ground.
14. Firms must not be gathered without permission from the Manager or Custodian.
15. Cutting or carving on buildings or benches is strictly forbidden.
16. No agents allowed to peddle their wares without permission.
17. No fireworks allowed inside the grounds.
18. Insurance companies demand that we keep this rule.
19. Do not kill the birds. We have a bird club now.
20. Horses must not be tied to the trees on the Chautauqua grounds.
21. No firearms allowed in or near the ground during the assembly season. This carries a penalty with it.
22. Complaints concerning water pipes, scarcity of water or defective gasoline stoves must be made to the manager.
23. Carry your day and week tickets constantly. Leave season tickets at the gate.
24. Do your part to help us keep Chautauqua clean.
25. Keep the dogs chained or muzzled from July 1st to August 31st. This is imperative. It protects the children.

There has been much in the newspapers regarding the difficulties of the C., P. & St. L. Ry., with indications of possible discontinuance of operation. It is the firm belief of those in position to judge the situation that there will be no discontinuance of operation, or if any occurs, it will be of short duration and come prior to the opening of the Chautauqua season. Those who express this belief base it upon the theory that if the properties of the present corporation are disposed of at forced sale, some other interests will acquire them and continue operation. One large truck system and particular could make excellent use of the entire C., P. & St. L. system, if purchased at "knock-down" price, as seems likely. Another smaller Branch. However, in order to have no question as to transportation facilities between Alton and Chautauqua, arrangements have been made with Captain Brock under which double daily service will be given (if train service be discontinued), leaving Chautauqua about 6:15 A. M., to connect with 7:57 A. M. electric limited at Alton for St. Louis; returning leaving Alton upon arrival of the Alton limited electric train, which leaves Eads Bridge trolley station at 8:04 A. Therefore, no one contemplating spending any part or all of the season at Chautauqua need be deterred from perfecting such plans because of possible lack of transportation facilities.
