Every dollar of income received is put into repairs and improvements and the necessary expenses of the Chautauqua. The only sources of income for the upkeep of the grounds is through admissions, commissions and assessments.

gives promise of being one of the best in years. There are many reasons for this. The hard roads from Alton, Jerseyville and outlying towns make it more accessible than ever before. The improved train service we are promised, the acquiring of the Swimming Pool by Chautauqua and directly under their management, and a constructive program along educational, recreational and religious lines is diversified enough that one can enjoy all or any part of same without a chance of being bored or "fed up."

If you are athletically inclined there is tennis, basket-ball, roque, quoits, baseball, etc. If you crave recreation there is hiking, horse-back riding, boating, dancing, games, etc.

The religious program constitutes the morning devotions in the New Chapel, the Kupferlee Memorial, Sunday School, and a sermon every Sunday by a well known minister. Prayer meeting one night a week and special Sunday evening song service.

The Hotel will again be under the management of the Ladies' Civic Improvement Association, and is being thoroughly renovated and refurnished.

The Cafeteria, with Mr. and Mrs. Wilson in charge, will serve you as efficiently as in the past. Kentucky Home, Step-Inn, the Willard, besides various cottages and a general store conducted by Mr. Brainard, as in the past, assures you of ample accommodations.

We will again have with us our Orchestra, the St. Louis Trio, Messrs. Card, Meade and Lewis, who last year added much to the life and enjoyment of Chautauqua.

This resort is the Mecca for the children; there is no safer place for them—every child there is one of our big family. A Kindergarten will be conducted one hour a day for the younger children. A small fee will be charged to cover the cost of materials. The Kindergarten will be under the direction of Miss Helen Gregory, a graduate of Stevens College. She will also have charge of a Children's Pageant.

The Bird Club will have a very definite program this year, with nature study for adults.

We must not overlook the splendid work of the King's Daughters' Home and the Summer Rest—boarding houses for employed women and girls. A real work is done here where a girl can spend her vacation and receive protection by the splendid women in charge.
