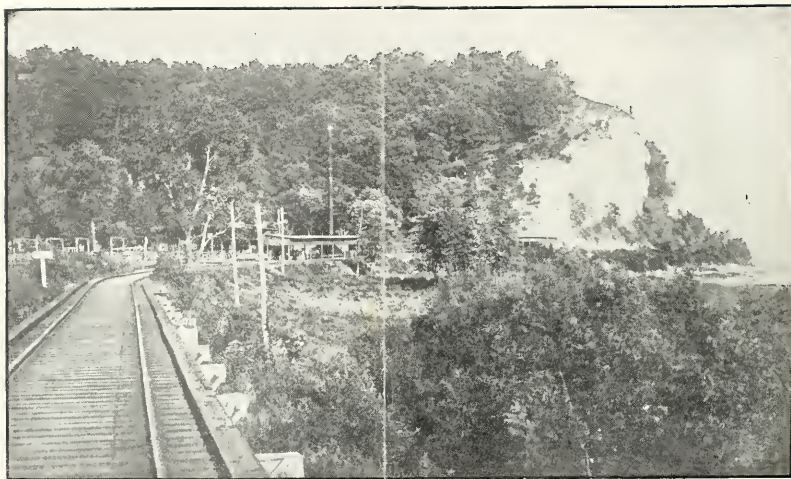

New Piasa Chautauqua

The forty-eighth season of the **Piasa Chautauqua** will cover a period of ten weeks, during which time entertainment is furnished, which is both healthful and uplifting.

Not the smallest part of a summer at this resort is the delightful community spirit that prevails at all times, a cottage colony with all the comforts of the city and delightful cool nights.

While most of the cottages (some 130) are occupied by owners, there are several that may be rented and accommodations at the Springs Hotel may be had at all times.

We are presenting you the program for the forty-eighth season of the **Piasa Chautauqua** and cordially invite you to spend your summer with us. We feel that we have much to offer you in the way of a summer rich in possibilities. Chautauqua is a unique resort and no place can you find the environment it offers. We still hold to the traditions and yet are sufficiently up to date to provide entertainment and recreation for all.

Chautauqua is chartered under the laws of Illinois as an educational, religious and recreational association. It is owned by a group of stockholders who elect from their number twelve directors who have entire supervision and management of the grounds. Every dollar of income received is put into repairs and improvements and the necessary expenses of Chautauqua. The only sources of income for the upkeep of the grounds is through admissions, commissions and assessments.

The object for which the Corporation is formed, is to conduct a Chautauqua Assembly for religious, educational and scientific purposes and to maintain and operate therewith a summer resort for those of Christian belief.

The Program Committee have endeavored to build this the forty-eighth program, to suit the taste of all, and in keeping with the desires of our guests, the lighter form of entertainment for those who are seeking rest and relaxation and yet a few diversions along more serious lines. In other words, we try to live at Chautauqua, the life of healthy, normal folks, embracing religion, recreation and work.

Special Notices

Many changes will be found at Chautauqua this year. The new channel at the river front will enable the large boats to land and accommodations for the smaller craft have been made.

The Post Office and Novelty Stand have been centralized at the Bridge. The moving of the Post Office from in front of the Kupferle Memorial Chapel is a great improvement and lends to beautifying the grounds around the Chapel.

All religious services will be held in the Chapel this year, with the exception of Sunday School, which will be held at the Auditorium. It is hoped to have accommodations for Mass to be held on the grounds. This is in accordance with our broad-minded religious principles.

Large out-door Swimming Pool with up-to-date filtering equipment. New apparatus and granitoid walks all around.

A filling station at the Jerseyville gate is an innovation and it is hoped our guests will patronize it for service.

Mrs. Dorothy McCurdy, who has conducted the Trellis Tea Room for the past three years, has taken the Belleview Cottage right at the fork of the Jerseyville and Springfield Avenue road. Has completely remodeled and re-furnished it. She will specialize in a great need at Chautauqua. Besides furnishing rooms and board she will serve meals, cater to card parties and luncheons, delicatessen service, and will be open after the entertainments for light lunches. An innovation this year will be an up-to-date Kindergarten. The Misses Hesley and Gledhill of Jerseyville are both graduates of the National College of Education and Stephens College respectively, in kindergarten courses. Their program is unique and a great opportunity for the little ones. Their idea is to give the children all types of novel work—clay modeling, paper construction and painting, play ground work.
