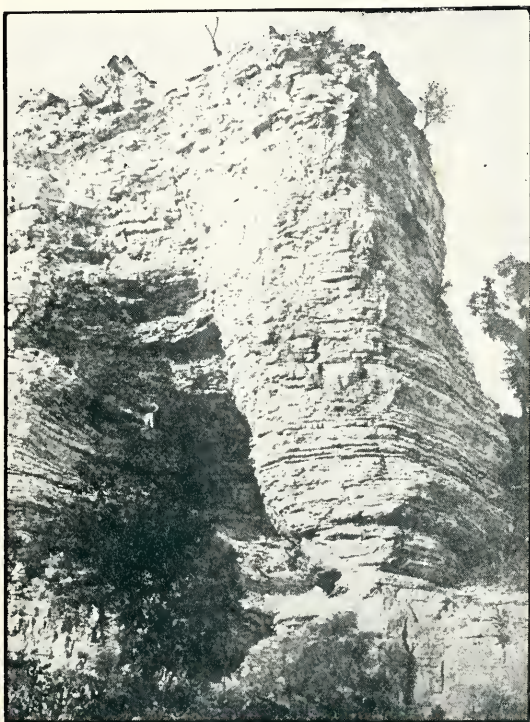

Athletics at Chautauqua



ATHLETICS and outdoor activities have long been a feature at Chautauqua. In addition to Tennis courts for Juniors and Seniors, Roque courts for men and women, and outdoor Volleyball court and three Shuffleboard games of the most improved Florida design, a baseball diamond is maintained which is the scene of much activity during the week and over the weekend.

Tournaments, games and healthful competition are carried on in all these sports under expert supervision and a championship tournament is held in each branch of sport with prizes for the winners. A Track and Field Championship Meet is held each year and Swimming Races and Diving Competition are a feature of the season at the great sanitary Outdoor Pool. Also a Water Carnival Day is an annual event, consisting of Motorboat, Rowboat and Canoe Races on the Mississippi River.

Exercise under a healthful sun out in the fresh open air is a wonderful tonic for your physical well-being and is a great boon to your good health. Chautauqua affords every opportunity to take advantage of these, especially in the great outdoor swimming pool where health abounds and pleasant exercise is enjoyed under competent and well-trained life-guards. Lessons are given to those who cannot swim by an expert instructor.

Connect with this route at Piasa Creek Bridge about twelve miles north of Alton, Illinois, and then follow signs reading "To Chautauqua."
