

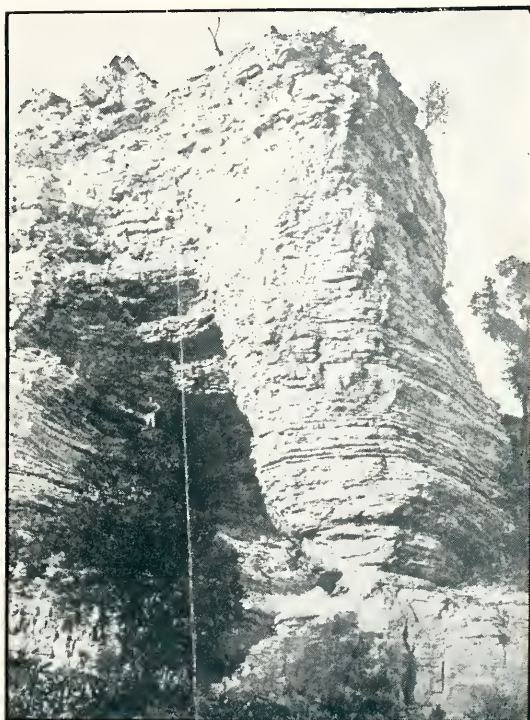

The Story of Lover's Leap

An Illini Legend

NEXT to the legend of the Piasa bird, the story of Lover's Leap is perhaps the most noted and interesting of those around Chautauqua. The point described is the high white bluff that looks over the great river and the sleepy little valley. Stories of Lover's Leap are typical wherever there are overhanging bluffs or precipitous hills. Because of the great age of this Indian version, it could most likely be considered that this is the original Lover's Leap story.

Once upon a time, years and years ago, long before the white man ever came to this country, a slight little Indian maiden crept out on the top of a high white limestone bluff and sang to the twilight. It was a rippling little song, care-free and filled with laughter; it was a grateful little song filled with thanks to the Great Spirit for many mercies; and it was a worshipful little song, for she bowed her head as the sun slipped behind the cool waters. Her name was Laughing Moon, and she was the only daughter of Owatoga, the Illini Chieftain. Her hair was as black as the raven's wing, and her eyes sparkled like the twinkling stars. She was the darling of the Illini tribe, not because she was the daughter of the chieftain, but because of her rare sweet charm.

In the evenings the braves would come to the tepee of her father, there to sit about the fire and talk of war and of deeds of valor. Little Laughing Moon found this dull, so she crept out on the high white bluff that overlooks the Great Water and the beautiful little valley, there to sing to the rippling waters, to talk to the dancing stars, to be lulled by the swishing of the tree tops, and to dream of the lover that should some day be hers. The old chieftain was accustomed to her sitting on the great rock at night. At times she remained until the moon was high, but he did not disturb her, for he himself had loved the stars at night, the night noises, the call of the birds as they sought their mates, the rippling of the waters, and the swishing of the night breezes in the tree tops.

One night as Laughing Moon lay there watching the little silver ripples in the pathway of the moon, her clear eye saw an object swimming down the moon path on the water. At first she thought it was a silver otter, or perhaps a jeweled mermaid, but as it came nearer, she realized that it was a swimmer making his way across the stream. Presently it disappeared, and she lay back wondering who it could be that swam so late at night. Suddenly she lifted her head; she heard a scratching and tugging on the side of the cliff, and in a few moments a bronze head, a pair of broad shoulders, a light sinewy form was beside her. She noted instantly that he wore a belt of yellow beads. That meant that he belonged to the Osage tribe, the most hated enemy of her father and of the Illini braves. "Who are you?" she whispered. "Why do you come here and did you really climb the bluff?" "I am Black Otter," he answered, "the best swimmer of the Osage tribe. I can swim so silently

that even the fishes do not hear me. Many times I have swum past this rock just to look at you. Tonight it was the moonlight that betrayed me, but it was your beauty that gave me strength to scale the rock." "You must leave," she whispered. "Should my father find you here, you would be slain like a beast and thrown into the river." "I will go," he said. "But I will come again. Wait for me in the moonlight." With that he slipped over the edge of the bluff and was gone.

Many nights he came and sat by her side, and many were the tales he told her, but the sweetest one was his tale of love. She forgot that he wore the yellow belt of the Osage tribe.

At last their secret was discovered by the jealous lovers of the Illini tribe, and the news was carried to old Owatoga. The old chieftain berated them for bringing false news of his darling. It could not be true. No Osage brave could climb the bluff. He would see for himself.

That night he made his way to the top of the high white bluff, carrying his bow and a sharp pointed arrow which he had dipped in the poison of a copperhead snake. He could scarcely believe his eyes when he saw the Osage brave climb over the edge of the cliff and take little Laughing Moon in his arms and call her his "tender little dove." Old Owatoga's love for his daughter was great, but his hatred for the Osage tribe was greater, so without a moment's thought, he placed his arrow within his bow and drew it with a trained arm, although it trembled with age.

Little Laughing Moon's eyes were filled with adoration as she looked at her stalwart lover. Suddenly she stiffened with fear; she had heard the faint crackle of a twig in the bushes, and looking in the direction from which it came, had seen the outline of Owatoga's bow. Instantly she threw herself in front of her lover, but the bow had been drawn and the arrow released. Quickly it sped and imbedded itself in the maiden's heart. The grim old warrior staggered, his vision blurred as he saw little Laughing Moon crumple at the feet of her lover. A loud cry of distress came from the lips of the old man, a call for help. Instantly an angry horde appeared; it was the Illini braves who had followed the old man to the top of the bluff. With murderous threats they advanced. There was no fear in Black Otter's eyes. Lifting the tiny little maiden in his arms and holding her body closely to him, he cast upon them a look of cold defiance, then leaped to his death from the top of the tall bluff into the darkening waters below.

The old chieftain turned remorsefully homeward. He realized his tragic mistake. With his own hand he had sent the poisoned arrow into the heart of his beloved child.

The Indians named the bluff "Lover's Leap"; and to this day the wind sighs, the rippling waters do not sing, and the silver moonbeams glide silently over the high white rock.

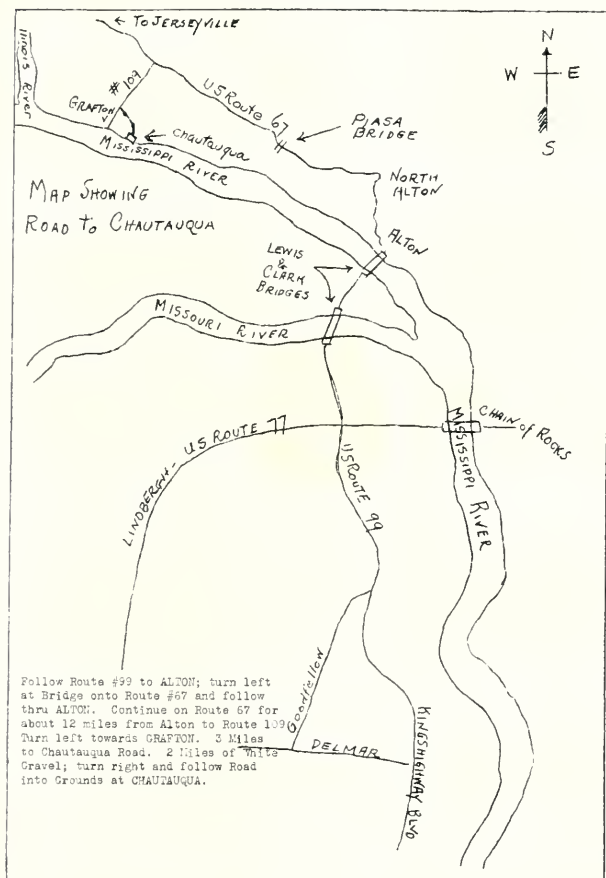

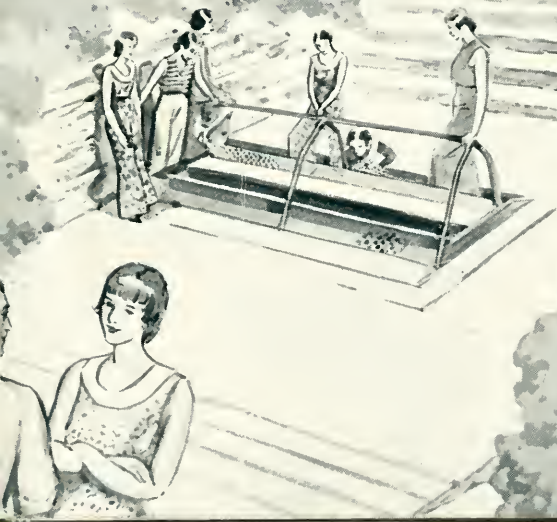

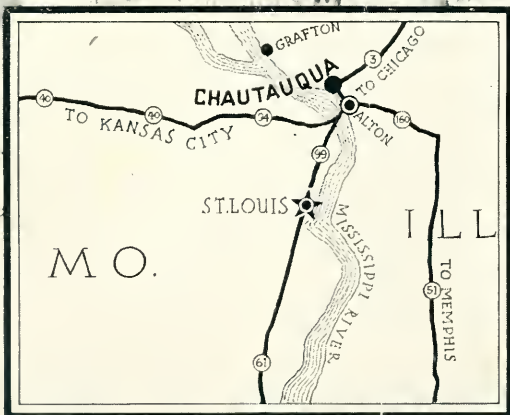




Pleasure, Activity and Health
