A Brief History of Chautauqua

IN 1885, two committees were authorized to find a location for a Chautauqua grounds. The St. Louis committee consisted of Rev. B. St. James Fry and Laymen J. A. Field and F. M. Doan. The committee from Southern Illinois was J. W. Phillips, R. H. Manier, J. A. Scarrett and F. M. Van Treese, who were ministers. The laymen were M. R. Locke, G. W. Brown and T. Harrison.

The committees met in Alton early in July, where they chartered a steamer to take them up the Mississippi. As the boat slowly steamed up the placid river, they eagerly scanned the bluffs hoping to find a valley suitable for their needs.

It was noon, when they ordered the Captain to pull into the shore, near the West Bluff—where Chautauqua now stands. In front of them was a hill, a ravine as they called it, on either side—the old maps called them Babbs' Hollow and Little Babbs' Hollow.

The day was extremely hot, as they made their way through a corn field, passing the Babcock cabin at the southern end of the point that separates the two valleys.

Finding an old abandoned corn field on their right, they walked over the dry and rotting corn stalks, where the Auditorium stands today, till they spied a tumbled down stable on the site of the present Chautauqua store. Farther up the hillside were the decaying logs of the old Sherer farm house.

They soon discovered the Spring, not as we see it today, boxed in concrete, but flowing strongly from its home beneath the rocks, just as the Indians found it, when it was their favorite camping ground.

Making a hasty survey of the land, they ate their lunch, deciding as they sat, beneath the lofty trees, to make this land a Western Chautauqua. Prayers were offered, a hymn was sung, as the birds sang and the blue jays screeched overhead.

Back they went to the boat, determined to buy the land. They found that the land belonged to a Mrs. McCairn. They also found that they would have to buy four hundred and ten acres, in order to control the whole valley, besides Mrs. McCairn would not sell any part of her land, but insisted that they buy it all. The land was purchased the following year.

On the day of the purchase it was decided to hold the first camp meeting, but again Mrs. McCairn entered the picture, for she refused to let them use the land until the deal was closed. The committee decided to use Babb's Hollow so that the first meeting was held in the other valley.

Rev. L. E. Cole, of Elsah, took charge of the preparations. Mr. M. R. Locke, of Jerseyville, was the first publicity agent for the Chautauqua. He sent circulars to all the nearby towns on July 13, 1885, inviting all those interested to attend the meetings beginning Tuesday, August 25, 1885, and lasting one week. The first meeting was largely attended, people

coming from St. Louis and Springfield, Illinois, as well as from nearby towns.

The Piasa Bluffs Assembly was incorporated according to the laws of the State of Illinois, July, 1885. The incorporators were Rev. B. St. James Fry, J. A. Field, F. M. Doan, Rev. R. H. Manier, G. W. Brown, T. Harrison, M. R. Locke and W. Armstrong.

Now they must look for money to purchase the land. Rev. F. M. Van Treese was elected corresponding secretary. He visited schoolhouses and churches and sold stock at fifty dollars per share. Finally he had enough money to purchase the land.

The second camp meeting was held on the present site of Chautauqua. Rev. J. A. Scarrett was elected superintendent of grounds. It was during his time that the land was plotted, trees were planted and the streets laid out. The auditorium and a few cottages were built. The first cottage was built near the Spring for Rev. Fry. It was painted yellow. Later it was moved to its present location near the Jersey gate.

In the year 1908 the Piasa Bluffs Assembly failed to meet its obligations. In 1909 The New Piasa Chautauqua Association was formed.

In 1889 the Assembly met from August 6th to August 27th. The price of admission was 25 cents per day; \$1.00 per week and \$2.00 for the season. Tents could be rented, 8 by 10, \$4.00; 10 by 12, \$5.00. Floors, \$1.50 extra. All parties not lot owners furnishing their own tents, \$1.00 for the privileges of the grounds.

The old programs show that they had, Old Folks' Day, Grand Army Day, Temperance Day, Book Concern Day, Music Day and Recognition Day.

The railroads furnished transportation from St. Louis for \$1.35 the round trip. The steamers, Spread Eagle and the steamer Alton, also ran from the Assembly grounds to St. Louis, \$1.25 the round trip.

Concessions were let in 1889 at the following prices: Lunch stands, \$15.00; Photo Galleries, \$5.00; and if one will walk to the Hillside cottage owned by Mrs. Marvel Butler they will see near the back of the building an opening about ten inches square where one of these photographers had his red glass to develop plates. Watermelon stands, \$5.00; Butcher shop, \$5.00; Coffee stands, \$5.00; News stand, \$3.00; Barber shops, \$3.00; Lodging, \$15.00.

The following men have been presidents of this Association: J. P. Woods, C. Bernet, D. W. Caughlan, J. T. Flint, W. K. Norris, and our present president, C. M. Horner.

So down the years we come to the present day. From the time the little band set foot on Chautauqua ground to the present, no lovelier spot can be found.

The mighty Mississippi flowing to the sea, the Bluffs on either side, timber covered hillside, wild flowers in bloom, the song of birds in the trees, the lights and shadows across the valley on a sunlit day. A fairyland under a full moon when the valley is bathed in pale moonlight. To a lover of nature it is the most beautiful place in the Middle West.
