Special activities for all children have been arranged with awards to be presented during the season to those meeting the tests and requirements of both study as well as play periods.

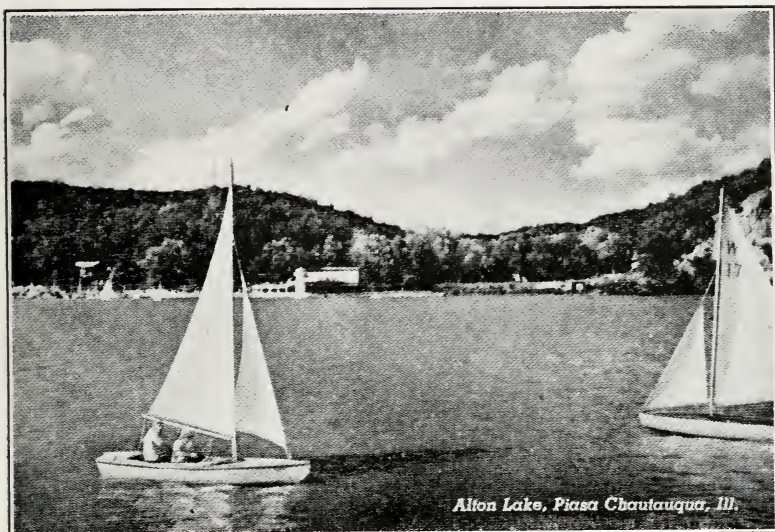

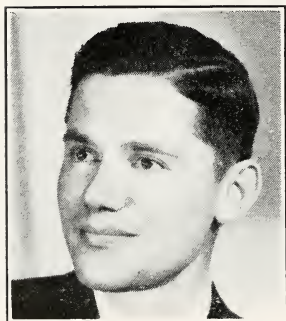

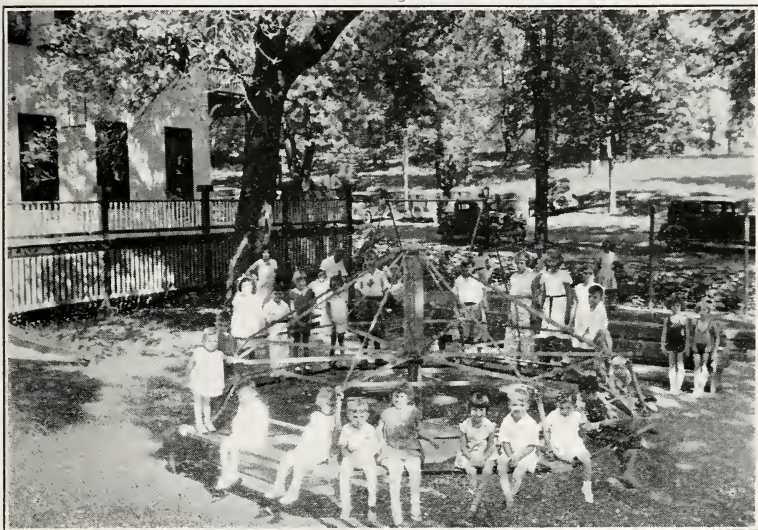

Mr. and Mrs. Scherman and children, and grandmother, Mrs. Anna Williams, of St. Louis, are at their summer home, "Schermansion".

Another attraction was the "College Baby Sitters" Betty Hollman of Illinois Wesleyan School of Music, Patricia Mitchell of Fontbonne College, Clayton, Mo., Kiki Griesedieck of Illinois University, Jack Jacoby, M. I. T., Boston, Mass., Bill Randall of South Carolina University, Bob White, formerly of Westminster, Fulton, Mo., and Jim Stallings, formerly of Purdue. They really do or did "sitting" while attending college.

The children, numbering about 100, received treats from various decorated booths, in the midway following the parade.
