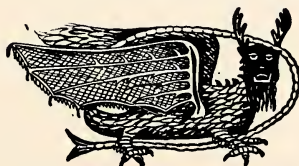

HOW TO REACH NEW PIASA CHAUTAUQUA

- By Telephone: Phone Alton, Illinois, and ask operator for Chautauqua, Illinois. Telephone calls may be placed to Springs Hotel or Kentucky Home. If calling for information about Chautauqua or for a resident of Chautauqua place call to Chautauqua Administration Building. (Messenger notifies resident of long distance call.)
- By U. S. Mail: Branch Post Office with outgoing and incoming mail daily. Proper address - - Chautauqua, Illinois.
- By Automobile: Illinois Route 100 to approximately 12 miles north of Alton, Illinois, then follow signs marked Chautauqua. Hard surfaced road into Grounds.
- By Boat: The docks at Chautauqua are privately owned and anybody wanting to visit friends at Chautauqua should make advance arrangements for docking. All guests on the Grounds, whether arriving by automobile or boat, must have tickets of admission.

Requirements for Admission

The Chautauqua Grounds are owned and operated by the New Piasa Chautauqua Association and every person entering or remaining on the grounds must have an Admission Ticket purchased from the Association. The Association reserves the right at all times to revoke the privileges granted to ticket holders and to limit the sale of tickets.

Prices of tickets are as follows:

(Note: Purchase of Guest Coupon Books is limited to holders of Adult Season Tickets and coupons are for use only of their house guests. Coupons are good only for the season in which issued.)

All automobiles must be brought to a full stop at the Gate House at entrance to grounds. Gatekeeper is required to determine that each person entering grounds holds ticket of admission. For your convenience carry Season Tickets with you. Also register Season Tickets at Administration Office within one week of purchase.

If you expect guests notify Gatekeeper in advance and make arrangement for admission charges either by paying for guests' admission or authorizing Gatekeeper to collect admission charges from your guests. Failure to make advance arrangements can cause embarrassment as Gatekeeper is not required to admit strangers to grounds simply because they announce they have come to visit a Chautauqua resident.

Persons arriving at Chautauqua Grounds by river must contact Manager of Grounds at Administration Building to arrange for tickets. No person is permitted to remain on grounds without a ticket.

Rules and Regulations Governing Chautauqua

All persons on the grounds of this Corporation shall OBSERVE and OBEY all By-Laws, Rules and Regulations of this Association AT ALL TIMES. The Management reserves the right to expel from the grounds or refuse admission to anyone not conforming to these rules and regulations.

ADMISSIONS: No person shall enter or remain on the grounds without a ticket of admission.

ANIMALS: No animals or fowls shall be permitted to run at large—nor shall dogs be allowed in the streets or public grounds of this Association unless muzzled or leashed.

BUILDING: No building or additions shall be erected, nor repair work started except with consent of the Board of Directors, under a permit signed by the Secretary. Nor shall any building or additions be done from June 15th to September 10th.

INSPECTION OF COTTAGES: The Grounds Committee shall have the authority to examine and inspect any cottage or place on the grounds, as to fire hazards, water, light and sanitary conditions at any and all times.

POOL: The Swimming Pool will be closed and all out of door games are prohibited from 12 M. on Saturday until 12 o'clock noon Sunday.

POSTERS: No poster, hand-bill, or picture shall be displayed on any part of the grounds other than on the Bulletin Board, and then only by permission of the Management.

AUTO SPEED LIMIT: Drivers are requested not to drive over 10 M.P.H. and to use car only when absolutely necessary as a safety measure for pedestrians and children on the grounds.

SAFETY SUGGESTIONS AGAINST FIRES:

Inspect the wiring in your cottage particularly for defects on lamps and appliances.

Do not add too many lamps or appliances on one circuit.

Inspect your stoves and flues.

Be careful in disposing of cigars, cigarettes and matches.

Place your surplus and waste papers in suitable container for disposal.

Religious Program

Since its inception as the Piasa Bluffs Assembly, a Methodist camp meeting ground, 70 years ago, Chautauqua has maintained its religious atmosphere. Here families bring up their children in a God-centered program of religious training and recreation. While enjoying the beauties of the Chautauqua Valley, the lure of the Piasa Bluffs and the thrills of Alton Lake, young and old parti-

cipate in a program of Christian training that gives purpose to the eleven-week summer season and sets Chautauqua apart from the usual resort.

Chautauqua is fortunate this year to have the services of J. Allan Mittler, a student of Eden Theological Seminary, Webster Groves, Missouri, as Resident Minister for the season.

Mr. Mittler is a native of Wisconsin who grew up in Iowa. His undergraduate work was done at Elmhurst College, Elmhurst, Illinois, from which he was graduated in June, 1954. While attending Eden Seminary during the past year Mr. Mittler has served as a field worker at Christ Evangelical and Reformed Church, Maplewood, Missouri, in the capacity of Youth Assistant and has served Brentwood Congregational Church, Brentwood, Missouri, as Organist-Choir Director.

His father is pastor of St. Matthew Evangelical and Reformed Church in St. Louis.

Sunday Morning Worship Services . . .

A Service of Worship is held each Sunday morning at 11 a.m. in the open-air auditorium. Chautauqua church is non-denominational. Prominent guest ministers from a variety of Protestant faiths preach at the Sunday morning services. Churchgoers also are given an opportunity at least once to hear the Resident Minister in a full length sermon. Some now-famous ministers have begun their preaching careers as student resident ministers at Chautauqua. The

week'y calendar of events in the back of the program lists the minister for each Sunday service.

Special music is provided by a youth choir under the direction of Mr. Mittler.

The Ecumenical movement is not new at Chautauqua! A wide variety of faiths worship God together in the beauty of Nature and the quiet of a Sabbath morning.

Chautauqua Church School . . .

Each Sunday morning at 9:45 a.m. Church School is held in the auditorium under the supervision of Mr. Joseph L. Rain and Mrs. Milton Grimm. A staff of capable teachers provides excellent training for all age groups. Accredited attendance cards

are given those who attend. Special recognition is given those with a perfect attendance record throughout the season. This year there will be an old-fashioned Sunday School picnic during the season — a highlight of the year's Sunday School activities.

Devotional Services . . .

Every Thursday night at the Memorial Chapel Devotional Services will be held under the leadership of J. Allan Mittler, resident minister. Services begin at 7:30. These mid-week services through the years have

become a traditional part of the program and are generously supported by the residents on the grounds as well as guests. Special music and special Bible studies will highlight the Devotional Services this year.

Recreational Program

Everybody plays at Chautauqua! That's part of the reason for the place. Young and old relax, away from the rigid schedules of city life, away from the ringing of school or telephone bells.

Organized play . . . of various degrees of physical exertion . . . is available for all ages. From play school for the tiny tots to Horseshoes or Bowling on the Green for senior citizens, all members of the family find plenty to play at Chautauqua.

For the Very Young . . .

Miss Barbara Rogers, a fourth generation Chautauquan, who, like her mother before her, has spent all of her summers at Chautauqua, will be in charge of the Play School. Barbara, a popular young lady with all age groups, is well fitted by training and experience to conduct the Play School activities and indoctrinate the young children with the ways and traditions of Chautauqua life.

Sessions of the Play School will be held Monday through Friday each week from 10 a.m. to noon. All children up to the age of 12 are eligible and invited to attend. Special playground for children near the hotel. Miss Rogers will have charge of the Children's Day program and children enrolled in Play School will be given an opportunity to participate in that program.

From "Ten through Teen-Age" . . .

There will be supervised play for both boys and girls throughout the summer, the Athletic Committee reports. Each Wednesday morning at 10 a.m. there will be a baseball game for the boys at the Athletic

Field. Also, throughout the season the Chautauqua Boys baseball team will play clubs in surrounding towns. Boys and girls are eligible to enter tournaments in various sports.

For All Ages

SWIMMING

Biggest news in the recreational activities is the new swimming pool that is under construction and scheduled for completion in mid-season. When extensive repairs and alterations became necessary on the old pool (which is a half century old) the Board of Directors, after very thorough study, concluded that the most sensible course would be to construct a modern pool which would meet all of the rigid safety and sanitation requirements that Illinois now imposes on swimming pool operators.

Because of the immense size of the old pool and the construction problems it presented in bringing it to required standards of the Illinois State Department of Health, Division of Sanitation, the cost of modernization of the old pool would have far exceeded the cost of a new pool. Hence the decision to present to the stockholders of Chautauqua the plan for financing, through a bond issue, the new swimming pool. While very much smaller than the old one, the new pool will meet all sanitation requirements, offer an opportunity for youngsters to learn swimming and diving, provide bathers with filtered water of uniformly comfortable temperature and give all Chautauquans a pool of which they can be proud.

Miss Susan Wessel will serve as life guard. Frank Woodrow again will be pool manager.

ROQUE

Through the years Roque has been one of the most popular sports at Chautauqua. A form of croquet, it originated in England many years ago and has been played at Chautauqua for some forty years. A game that is popular with all ages, the older men often beat out their younger opponents in the hotly contested annual tournament. Lighted courts make possible night as well as daytime games. If you're a stranger to Roque introduce yourself to any of the men, women or children at the courts and they'll be glad to explain the fine points of the game! A special court is maintained* for women and children.

BOWLING ON THE GREEN

Another English game, Bowling on the Green, or Lawn Bowling, was introduced to Chautauqua in 1953 by Chautauquans who had become fascinated by the game in Florida. It was an immediate hit - - both with men and women.

The game has been played in England for over 700 years. It came to America with the English settlers and has been popular in sections of the East ever since. In recent years it has achieved great popularity in Florida. Originally played on a closely cut grass lawn, in some places rinks of clay have proved more satisfactory. Rinks at Chautauqua are clay.

The game is played with "bowls" that are not truly round, one side being turned down slightly more than the other side. Thus when the speed leaves the bowl, it drops over on the slightly flattened side, causing the bowl to curve. Thus the bowl, when bowled toward the "jack," does not run in a straight line but describes an arc of a circle. Each bowl has two ivory disks on it, one larger than the other, the small disk marking the slightly flattened side of the bowl. When bowling, the small disk is held to the inside of the arc of the circle that reaches toward the jack.

The jack is a small china ball that is thrown down the rink, as a marker for the bowls to approach. The bowls nearest the jack at the end of the

inning count one point each. The game consists of a number of "ends," or innings, determined upon before the game is begun. All the bowls are bowled to the opposite end, trying to get as close to the jack as possible.

The game is for all Chautauquans, and all are invited to take part in it, either as a spectator or as a participant. Instructions will be given to those interested by competent instructors.

TENNIS

The all-weather tennis courts at Chautauqua have produced some noteworthy tennis players in years gone by. It is the hope of the Athletic Committee that every child who spends a summer at Chautauqua and is big enough to swing a racquet will master at least the fundamentals of tennis. As in many other sports on the grounds you can always find an "expert" who will give you some fine points on the game. Some of the best Chautauqua tennis players are in the 40-and-up age group. They need more competition from the younger players.

BADMINTON

Opposite the tennis courts and bowling green is a vacant lot owned by a Chautauquan who wants it used for a badminton court. Don't be backward about using it; he expects you to! And whether you're a beginner at the game or a skilled player you'll find your match on the Chautauqua grounds.

HORSESHOES

Pitching horseshoes is a sport which knows no age limit. In fact it often appears that players improve with age. Chautauqua has never had a shortage of persons who can throw ringers and leaners consistently. The great need is for more young persons to master the art. Young men, take a lesson or two from the old-timers and see if you can't match their skill. The horseshoe courts have been moved to the area opposite the Bowling on the Green courts, because the new swimming pool will occupy the old horseshoe courts.

SHUFFLEBOARD

While preparing new horseshoe courts was not difficult when it was decided late in the spring to locate the new swimming pool in the area near the Administration Building, the problem of relocating the shuffleboard courts was a more difficult one to solve hurriedly. Therefore no shuffleboard tournaments have been scheduled for the 1955 season but it is hoped that new courts will be ready for the 1956 season.

ARCHERY

Like many other forms of recreation that have developed at Chautauqua provisions for archery sprang from a combination of eager youth and an interested adult. For several years Mr. Bill Niergarth has been conducting meetings of the Robin Hood Club on the bluff behind his cottage. Here an enthusiastic group of

boys has been learning the fine points of archery and the equally fine points of safety and good sportsmanship. Nothing - - not even an invigorating swim - - could keep the young Robin Hoods from attending meetings regularly. This year, if sufficient additional persons express an interest, the archery range will be moved to the area near the baseball diamond and the sport made available to all ages. See Mr. Niergarth if you are interested in archery.

TABLE TENNIS

There's more than relaxation to the game of table tennis or ping-pong. For those who like to get their exercise quickly there are ping-pong tables waiting for you at the Riverfront Pavilion. Secure paddles and balls at Station Stand.

The only charge for participation in any of the sports at Chautauqua is for the use of the swimming pool. You are invited to participate in all of the other sports free of charge. Your admission ticket buys you the privilege of the playing courts.

BOATING

Not all of the recreation at Chautauqua is found on the grounds. The Mighty Mississippi River passes by our door, its current slowed by the dam at Alton to form Alton Lake. The Alton Lake area is one of the fastest growing boating areas in the United States, and Chautauqua, nestled in a valley between the

beautiful stone bluffs which stretch from Alton upstream to Grafton, Illinois, is the harbor for many of the area's pleasure boats. The docks at Chautauqua are maintained by the Chautauqua Yacht Club and rental of berths at the dock is through the Yacht Club. If motor boating, sailing, water sports or fishing appeal to you then you'll agree with many Chautauquans that the most fascinating side of Chautauqua life is its Life on the Mississippi. But you needn't own a boat to experience some of the thrill of the river. You can sit on Riverview Lookout, maintained by the L.C.I.A., and watch the mighty barges churn by, laden with whole "trainloads" of valuable cargo, or idle away the hours watching sailboats slip in and out amid

the motor-driven pleasure crafts that dot the majestic stream. And at the end of day you can turn your eyes upstream and see the sun set in a riot of color over the confluence of the Illinois River and the Mississippi.

It is not surprising that the committee of ministers and laymen seeking the site for the Chautauqua Assembly as they came by boat up the river from Alton immediately settled their eyes and minds on the beauty of the Valley as they saw it nestling between the stone bluffs that form the Illinois shore of the Mississippi. Every Chautauquan who sees Chautauqua from the River is eternally grateful that the Committee chose Piasa Valley for their Assembly site!

Entertainment Program

For seventy years dedicated persons have been coming to Chautauqua for "re-creation" from the hurried, hurrying schedule of toil that absorbs one's life. Its lively daily schedule of events makes some chide that you come to Chautauqua to rest up from busy city life and then return to the city to rest up from the busy schedule at Chautauqua. But, in change there is "re-creation" and restoration. Chautauqua is not to slow you down . . . but to build you up for the race of life ahead.

So come with us and enjoy the movies (carefully selected from the best and to appeal to the entire family) on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays; the Tuesday evening card parties for all ladies;

the Thursday evening devotional services at the chapel; the regular Sunday School and Worship Services on Sunday with noted guest ministers; the Sunday night special programs of music or home movies; the Saturday tournaments in various sports; the Fourth of July celebration, barbecue and fireworks display sponsored by the Men's Club; the Wednesday morning baseball games; the fabulous "Children's Day" that takes a whole week-end to portray and weeks of rehearsals to prepare; the Thursday night special programs for children; the exciting week-end of crowning the Yacht Club Queen and witnessing the boat races staged by the Chautauqua Yacht Club.

The daily calendar reveals some of the plans for the Seventieth Annual Season. Others will be announced in the auditorium as the season progresses.

Three special events deserve individual mention here: The popular Collegians Singing Group will make a return engagement on Sunday night, July 24. On Sunday night, July 31, the Ouatoga Society of Alton will appear in an impressive ceremony at the riverfront, doing a series of interpretive Indian dances and chants. The Ouatoga Society, composed of 32 Scouts and Explorers in the Piassa Bird Council, B. S. A., has performed for scores of organizations and has appeared on television. The director,

Eckford J. de Kay, has taken members of the Society to Indian reservations throughout the West to gather material for authentic dances and costumes. Their appearance on the shore of the Mississippi at Chautauqua promises to be a highlight of the

coming season. As the program goes to press the Alton Municipal Band is attempting to work out a schedule which will permit at least one performance at Chautauqua during the season. The band was a great hit in its first appearance here in 1954.
