Before a crowd of approximately 200 Chautauquans and guests, Director, Randy Workman, led the mixed group in a varied program of spirituals, musical comedy, semi-classical, and classical selections. The hour presentation opened with "Song of Jupiter", with June Ruddell as soloist.

Featured selections were Fred Waring's arrangement of the "Nutcracker Suite", presented in five parts; "April in Paris", sung by Norma Fry and the Men's Glee Club; and a medley from Roger and Hammerstein's "The King and I."

One of the outgrowths of the collegians was a male quartet. Accompanist was Kay Campbell. The 30 members and their families were guests of Mr. and Mrs. W.F. Griesedieck of East St. Louis at their cottage, "Pioneer". Griesedieck's son and daughter-in-law are members of the group.

The collegians is composed of businessmen and housewives who meet once a week in the basement of a South St. Louis church. The group was organized in 1949 by Carl Pitts and John Cannon, graduates of Westminster College in Fulton, Mo., who wanted to branch off on "a lighter vein from the usual college group arrangements".
