POOL APPEAL

INDIAN DANCERS BIG ATTRACTION AT CHAUTAUQUA

Sunday night, the bluffs around Piasa Chautauqua once again resounded with the music and shouts of Indian dances, as they did in the days of old, when the Ouatoga Society of Alton presented a program to a large crowd of residents and guests.

With the society's director, Eckford J. de Kay, introducing and explaining the 10 acts, 20 members presented their program of American Indian dances. An outstanding feature was the famous hoop dance, done with a flaming hoop by the chief of the society, William Norris. Among the dances were the Pueblo Rain Dance and Eagle Dance, Apache Devil Dance, and the finale number, "Pow Wow".

The society, an organization of high school boys and adults interested in Indian Lore, history, costumes, and dancing, gave its 29th performance of its year and a half of existence.

During an interview, De Kay said sometime in the coming few weeks a new booklet publication entitled "The History of the Piasa Bird" will be available to the Alton area public.

The booklet will contain pictures of the famous bird and information, written earlier as a thesis by John W. Gibbons of Alton.

The booklet, published under the auspices of the society, will be sold for the benefit of the organization.

POOL GIFTS GOOD BUT MORE NEEDED

Additional donations for the operation of the swimming pool are needed according to C.J. Jacoby, president of Chautauqua.

While the response has been gratifying, Mr. Jacoby pointed out that much more money is needed and those who have not contributed are urged to do so, while those who indicated they would increase their gifts if additional sums were needed are reminded that the entire cost of maintaining the pool and paying the manager and lifeguard must be taken care of without the customary revenue that in the past has come from season ticket sales and individual swimmer sales. This year, use of the pool is limited to Chautauqua residents and their guests with no admission charged. The pool is closed to outsiders. In other years Chautauqua collected several thousand dollars in swim ticket sales and guest gate admissions from those who came to Chautauqua to swim. The year the expense of operating the pool is as high as ever but revenue is limited entirely to gifts of interested Chautauqua residents.

THE OUTSIDER

The whole Gospel story is the story of an outsider--Jesus was born an outsider--"there was no room in the inn"--he lived as an outsider--"the Son of Man hath not where to lay his head"--and at the end he died outside the gate.

It is a parable, the life of Jesus--a parable of how the spirit and principles of Jesus have been crowded out of the affairs of humanity, great issues decided without even mention of his name. It is so today, even as it has been so through all the ages since he lived.

It is also an amazing paradox--here is the one person who shows us most completely what God is like. Yet he lived outside the pale, died outside the city gate. We worship, but do not obey. God is an outsider--an outcast in his own world.

Here plainly is why the world is what it is. Men piously profess God, but before Him in solemn prayer and ritual word, and then live as if he does not exist. Think of what things would be like if men believed what they say they do!

Today, in a torn and tangled world, Jesus is still an outsider. Until He is taken into the home, into the church, and into our very selves, there can be no peace on earth.
