1885 TO 1966

New Piasa Chautauqua — this year observing its eighty-first continuous season — started as a Methodist Camp Meeting Grounds in the summer of 1885.

A printed circular issued under date of July 13, 1885, announced the first Camp Meeting of the Piasa Bluffs Assembly to be held starting August 25, 1885, and continuing for one week.

The circular declared: "The object of the Chautauqua Assembly is to maintain a summer resort for literary, scientific and religious instruction."

That object has become the revered heritage of Chautauqua, each Season maintaining the standards adopted in that first year. This bulletin presents the 1966 eleven-week program which will start Saturday, June 18, and close Monday (Labor Day), September 5, 1966.

On behalf of your Board of Directors I welcome you back to Chautauqua and hope that you will again enjoy a pleasant and rewarding summer in this picturesque valley during this, the eighty-first, season.

We are faced with adapting to a changed physical, sociological and economic environment. Your Board of Directors has met this challenge by affirming, through legal procedures, the fact of the private ownership of the Chautauqua grounds; by the repair or replacement of essential community structures; by the construction of a serviceable small boat harbor; by providing additional parking space in the vicinity of the pool and athletic grounds; by further beautification of the grounds in the riverfront area by natural plantings, and by providing a diversified recreational and religious program which should offer something of interest to everyone. As of this writing these things have been accomplished without the anticipated necessity of an increase in assessments or membership fees.

Through the generosity of groups and individuals additional projects for the betterment of Chautauqua are underway.

Our rules and regulations are few. We ask you to observe them; because we all live in such close proximity it is expected that the rights of others will be respected. Our roadways serve as our sidewalks so motorists will be expected to exercise caution. Our traffic laws will be enforced.

Invite your friends and relatives to share with you the facilities and fellowship of this pleasant valley.

By - Laws

ARTICLE II

OBJECT AND PURPOSES

Section 1. Object. The object for which the association was formed as stated in its certificate of incorporation is:

“To conduct a Chautauqua Assembly for religious, educational and scientific purposes and operate in connection therewith a summer resort.”

Section 2. Policies. In fulfillment of this purpose, the association has since its organization found it feasible and possible to operate successfully without profit to its shareholders, to maintain well attended religious services and classes, to provide a place, facilities, and supervision for wholesome recreation and restful living during the summer season, and does hereby declare and determine that a continuation of such policies is for the best interest of the association, is essential to the accomplishment of its objects and will most effectively contribute to the physical, moral and spiritual welfare of its shareholders, cottage members, their families and guests, accordingly:

Section 3. Non-Commercial. It is declared that it shall be the policy of the association to prevent Chautauqua from becoming a commercial or secular enterprise during the period of its commitments to its cottage members, expiring November 30, 1985.

Section 4. Not for profit. The association shall continue to be operated and conducted without profit to its shareholders, and the net income, if any, shall not be accumulated for, and be paid to, or inure to the benefit of, its shareholders.

Section 5. Religion. The association shall continue to provide leadership and facilities for religious education and worship services, Christian but non-sectarian in character, as the underlying motif of the organization, and shall permit no sectarian or anti-Christian services or activities.

Section 6. Recreation and Retreat. The association shall, in connection with its religious program, provide facilities and leadership for children, and shall operate and conduct Chautauqua as a peaceful, wholesome, pleasant and safe place for rest and retreat from the pressures of modern living.

Section 7. Revocation or Amendment. This article shall be the central guide and control of the officers, directors and shareholders in all their actions and decisions, and shall not be revoked or amended except by a vote of not less than three-fourths of the entire board of directors and three-fourth of the shares of stock of the association, and then only after at least thirty-days notice by United States Mail, postage prepaid, to all officers, directors and shareholders, setting forth specifically and in detail the proposed resolution for revocation or amendment to be submitted for consideration.

Rules and Regulations Governing Chautauqua

Rules and Regulations governing daily living at Chautauqua are conceived in the interest of promoting public safety and making a pleasant and enjoyable stay for everyone possible. The cooperation of all persons in observing and obeying all By-Laws, Rules and Regulations of the Association at all times will be greatly appreciated.

1. **VEHICLES:** (a) All automobiles must be brought to a full stop at the Gate House at entrance to the Chautauqua grounds upon entering or leaving. The Gatekeeper is required to determine that each person entering the grounds is properly authorized for admission.

b—The speed limit of all motor vehicles on the Chautauqua grounds is 15 miles per hour. All "Stop" signs must be obeyed.

c—No one may operate a motor vehicle on the Chautauqua grounds who does not possess a Driver's License of the State in which he resides and who is not adequately covered by liability insurance. All motor vehicles are required to have a state license.

d—All residents and guests are urged to leave cars parked and to walk when possible. The unnecessary driving of motor vehicles on Chautauqua grounds will not be permitted.

e—Anyone judged guilty of careless driving shall be prohibited from driving on Chautauqua grounds.

f—Bicycles are not to be ridden on public walks or the board walk. Bicycle riders are urged to exercise caution in riding their bicycles.

2. **COTTAGE GUESTS:** Owners wishing to have guests in their cottages must notify the Chautauqua manager and submit complete information about prospective guests to the board. The board reserves the right to withhold approval on applications.

If you expect guests, notify the gatekeeper in advance and make arrangements for their admission. Failure to make advance arrangements can cause embarrassment as the gatekeeper is not authorized to admit strangers to the grounds simply because they announce they have come to visit a Chautauqua resident.

3. **BUILDING:** No building or additions shall be erected, nor repair work started except with consent of the Board of Directors, under a permit signed by the Secretary. No building or additions shall be done from June 15th to September 10th.

3a. Any cottage owner who intends to install an air-conditioner, electrical stove, electric hot water heater, or any other electrical appliances that consume a large amount of current must obtain approval of the Board of Directors.

4. **COTTAGES:** The Grounds Committee shall have the authority to examine or inspect any cottage or place on the Grounds as to fire hazards, water, light, and sanitary conditions at any or all times.

Rules and Regulations Continued

5. **ANIMALS:** No animals or fowls shall be permitted to run at large. Dogs or cats shall not be allowed on the streets or public grounds of this Association unless leashed.

6. **OPEN FIRES:** Burning of trash or other open fires are not permitted on the grounds at any time except by paid employees of the Association.

7. **NOISES:** Your cooperation and consideration of your neighbor is asked in loud playing of musical instruments, radios and televisions at all times. Quiet hour shall be observed at 11 p.m. on week nights and 12:30 a.m. on Saturday nights.

8. **GAMES:** Use of courts or playing of all out-of-doors games is prohibited from 11 p.m. on Saturday to 12 o'clock noon Sunday. All outdoor games are restricted daily between the hours from 11 p.m. and 8 a.m.

9. **INTOXICATING LIQUORS:** The consuming of beer or intoxicating liquors shall not be permitted at any time on public grounds of Chautauqua.

10. **POSTERS:** No posters, hand bills, signs, or pictures shall be displayed on any part of the grounds other than on the Bulletin Board, and then only by permission of the Management. Approved Chautauqua organizations may obtain permission to advertise special events by referring request to office manager at the Administration Building.

11. **GARBAGE AND TRASH:** Garbage and trash shall be placed in covered containers. It will be collected at regular intervals during the season.

a—Soda bottles must be returned to the dispensing machine from which they were taken.

b—Papers and trash should be deposited in containers which are provided for this purpose around the grounds.

12. **GUNS AND FIREARMS:**

a—All of the Chautauqua grounds is registered as a Game Refuge. It is, therefore, against the law as well as our rules to hunt or discharge fire arms at any time and at any place on Chautauqua property. This also applies to air guns or air rifles.

b—The discharge of fire works, fire crackers or bombs of any type is not permitted at Chautauqua at any time.

The Management reserves the right to expel from the Grounds, or to refuse admission to anyone not conforming to these rules and regulations.

Administration Office

John Buerkle will be in charge of the Administration Office this season. Any questions regarding membership or miscellaneous problems on the grounds should be directed to the Office. All guest and pool fees are to be paid weekly at the Office.

Grounds

Under authorization by the Board of Directors many changes and improvements have been made since the close of the 1965 season. Spear-headed by the planning and personal activities of the Grounds and the Forward Planning Committees, a new Board Walk has been built; improvements have been made to the Station Stand in addition to rebuilding the Men's and Ladies' Rest Rooms on the ground floor; the Lighthouse has been repaired and the pumping plant has been restored to top efficiency; plans were approved and money budgeted for a new Lookout, but bad weather delayed a start of construction, so that as this Program goes to press it is not definite whether or not the Lookout will be built in time for use this summer.

Otto Huff, Grounds Manager, and his regular helpers, in addition to some outside help, worked every available day during the fall, winter and spring, and much credit must be given them for the results attained.

Otto is in charge of all maintenance work, so any difficulties regarding water, lights, or sewers should be referred to him.

Completion and opening of the Great River Road in the late summer of 1965 created a new and difficult problem for Chautauqua, because it established a new and public access to the Grounds. That was particularly true in demands of residents of Fern Glen Valley.

Contending that Chautauqua is a private Grounds, the Board of Directors authorized our attorney, Jim Keehner, to file suit in the Circuit Court of Jersey County, at Jerseyville, for an injunction to restrain the public from using our roads, and for declaration of the private nature of our Chautauqua properties. The residents of Fern Glen Valley countered with a suit for an injunction against Chautauqua and a plea to declare all roads in Chautauqua as public roads. If granted, that injunction would have, in effect, prevented us from in any way attempting to prohibit the public from driving through our Grounds.

After several court hearings, during which time considerable evidence was heard and exhibits were admitted, the presiding judge denied injunctions to both sides and specifically ruled that Chautauqua is private property and designated such properties as the streets, sidewalks, play grounds, Auditorium, Chapel, Concession Stands, picnic areas, tennis courts, etc., etc. The Court ruled that Park Avenue, from Fern Glen Valley to the access to the Great River Road (while owned by Chautauqua) may be used by the residents of Fern Glen Valley, members of their families, and the public; and the road leading to the old entrance to our Grounds at the end of Jersey Avenue (while owned by Chautauqua) may be used by residents of Fern Glen Valley and members of their families, BUT NOT BY THE PUBLIC. (The capital letters are ours).

This edict of the Court establishes the privacy of Chautauqua which stockholders and cottage owners have enjoyed and valued through the years. To perpetuate that condition, the Board of Directors has ruled that there shall be no public service of any kind on the Grounds. Virtually the only public service remaining in Chautauqua for the past several years was our "Post Office" which was operated as a Branch Office out of the Elsah Post Office. As such, it was a Federal function and therefore definitely a public service. So, the Board of Directors has terminated such arrangement and has established a Postal Service for Chautauqua, which will operate as follows:

The Office Manager will go to Elsah each week-day morning and pick up a sack of Chautauqua mail. Private lock boxes have been installed in the Administration Office and will be assigned to residents upon request there. The mail sack will be retained at the Office for the receipt of outgoing mail and each week-day afternoon the Office Manager will deliver the sack and its contents to the Elsah Post Office.

Because Chautauqua, under this arrangement, will not have a Post Office identity and will not have a Zip Code Number, a change in addressing is in order. Your mail must be addressed as follows:

This arrangement will be continued during the entire season and until the Administration Office is closed in early September.

with the cottages available and details relative to their sale or rental. Mrs. Huff can be reached at her cottage "Rock Bottom", or by phone — 466-1963.

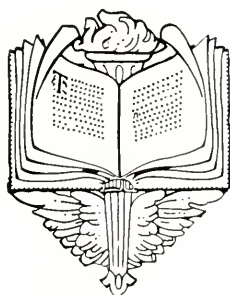
Religious Program

The Church Sunday School, which meets at 9:45 A.M. Sunday mornings during the Season, is under the direction of Joseph L. Rain, chairman of the Religious Committee of the Board of Directors.

The Sunday morning Worship Service is held in the Auditorium at 11:00 A.M. with the Resident Minister presenting guest minis-

ters selected and invited by the Religious Committee.

Each weekday morning, Monday through Friday, the Resident Minister will conduct devotional services in the Chapel, and each Thursday evening, throughout the season, the Resident Minister will conduct Devotions in the Chapel, starting at 7:30 P.M.



Resident Minister

Our Resident Minister for this season of 1966 will be John J. van der Graaf, a pre-Ministerial Student and Sociology Major at Oklahoma City University. He is the son of the Rev. Jans J. van der Graaf, D.D., who has been a guest minister at Chautauqua in previous seasons and who, again, will be with us this summer.

John has had experience in church work all his life. He has served as Youth Director at St. Luke's Methodist Church in Oklahoma City, and has acted in the capacity of Supply Minister in worship services of churches in Missouri and Oklahoma. He spent the summer of 1965 traveling in Europe.

He has been active in many phases of college life. He was Class Representative on the O.C.U. Senate; was a member of the Board of Governors for Circle K; member of Kappa Alpha Order where he served in various offices which required experience in planning and leadership.

Because of his participation in Youth Organizations of the church, he plans to put much emphasis on youth activities. He also will assist with the Church School.

Education and Entertainment Program

PLAY SCHOOL

Because there was no applicant this season for the position of Play School Director, the Play School will be supervised by three assistant directors — Betsy Fischer, who served in a similar capacity last season; Ann Schiffer-decker, and Mary Ann Callahan. The Play School is conducted under the auspices of the L. C. I. A.

Play School hours are from 10:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon, Monday through Friday. All children on the Grounds, ages three through twelve, are welcome to attend the Play School activities.

One of the highlights of the Season is the Children's Weekend — this year, Friday, August 5, and Saturday, August 6. On Friday evening the children of the Play School will present a Pageant and on Saturday afternoon they will be guests of the L. C. I. A. at a parade through the Grounds, followed by treats in front of the Old Cafeteria, and by games and races on the Riverfront Athletic Field.

The activities will be closed that evening by the Children's Day Dance at the Pavilion.

MOVIES

Movies again will be shown on four nights of each week — Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday — with three exceptions of Saturday, July 16, the night of the Patio Party at the Swimming Pool; Friday, August 5, the night of the Children's Day Pageant,

and Saturday, August 13, the night reserved for the Chautauqua Players. The movies for this season, again, have been carefully selected to appeal to all ages, and attention was given to the choice of shorter movies on orchestra dance nights.

COMMUNITY SINGING

Jim Keehner, again this season, has been kind enough to offer his services as leader for group singing before the movies

on Friday and Saturday nights. Under Jim's capable leadership we anticipate a renewed interest in Community Singing.

Recreational Program

SOFTBALL

Softball practice is held regularly and games will be scheduled for the boys at regular intervals.

TENNIS

Two excellent Tennis Courts are available for everyone who enjoys this sport. Tennis tournaments will be held in late August.

ATHLETICS

Chautauqua attempts, in its athletic program, to develop not only physical skills, but also sportsmanship. At a special ceremony Saturday, August 27 when the winners of the athletic contests are presented awards and trophies, special recognition is given to the boy and girl who exemplify outstanding sportsmanship.

BASKETBALL

A basketball backboard is available and free throw contests are held. There will be added emphasis placed on fundamental shooting this year.

BOWLING ON THE GREEN

Both men and women have found Bowling on the Green a satisfying recreation and exercise. Regular tournaments will be held at the end of the season and champions will be crowned.

GOLF

Through the courtesy of Westlake Country Club of Jerseyville, Chautauquans are permitted use of the golf course every day except Sunday and holidays. The greens fee is \$1.50 for nine holes. There is a snack bar in the club house.

HORSESHOES

Good Horseshoe Courts are maintained at Chautauqua, shoes are furnished, and in the past many players have found this to be a relaxing sport. Champs will be crowned at the end of the year.

ROQUE

Roque is an old and unique Chautauqua sport. The court is maintained and balls are furnished. Mallets are available through the manager at the office. Tournaments for young and old are carried out throughout the season with champions to be crowned on August 27.

SHUFFLEBOARD

Two new professional size shuffleboard courts are located near the Administration building. The courts are in constant use by youngsters of all ages. Tournament play will be held.

SWIMMING

Swimming is an established sport and recreation at Chautauqua, in a pool that meets all safety and health standards of the State of Illinois. Regular practice is held so that teams may be organized for competition and Red Cross Life Saving classes are held at regular intervals.

At the time this Program is going to press, a Pool Manager has not been selected, but one will be in charge when the swimming season starts. Nancy Kreid will be the Life Guard, and Jane Misegades will be Assistant Life Guard. They have had Red Cross Life Saving Training and are well qualified for their duties.

The Pool is open every day from 1:00 to 5:00 P.M., and from 6:30 to 8 P.M. on Tuesdays and Sundays. The Pool will be open on other evenings if the temperature and the weather permit.

Organizations

Ladies Civic Improvement Association

The 81st season of Chautauqua promises to be a busy season for the L. C. I. A., whose membership is open to all the ladies on the grounds.

Following its purpose, which is to further the civic, social, and spiritual welfare of Chautauqua, the L. C. I. A. sponsors the Girls' Club; provides for the Children's Day weekend; sponsors the weekly card parties; provides chaperones for the Saturday night dances; plans Thursday night activities for the children, and helps to prepare the Chapel and the Auditorium for our religious services.

In accordance with such purpose, the L. C. I. A. this past

winter adopted a program of re-finishing the interior walls and ceiling of the Chapel at an estimated cost of \$2,500. To supplement its reserve funds, the L. C. I. A. asked the Men's Club to join in the program as well as to participate in the accomplishment. The Men's Club at its Winter Meeting pledged the sum of \$500 for this improvement. At the time this Bulletin is going to press it is anticipated the work will be finished by opening of the summer program.

With its Memorial Fund, sustained by contributions given as tributes, the L. C. I. A. beautifies the Grounds by planting trees, flowers, and shrubbery.

Chautauqua Yacht Club

The Chautauqua Yacht Club, a separate corporation, has been somewhat inactive during the past two years because of construction of the Great River Road, a project which included the creation of a land-locked harbor at the west side of our valley. Entrance to the Harbor was established under a highway bridge, such arrangement providing for run-off of spring and storm waters from our Valley and for storm water run-off from Fern Glen Valley.

Since Chautauqua is located on the Alton Lake, our river front provides a natural area for our boating enthusiasts.

The Harbor and its entrance were dredged this spring under a special contract, with hope that docks could be built and Yacht Club members enjoy full use of the facility this year. As this Program goes to press, it is not certain if that goal will be reached but officers of the Club have pledged every effort to that end.
