The Chautauqua Movement

The Original Chautauqua

The original Chautauqua in western New York was founded in 1874, as a training camp for Sunday School teachers. From its very beginning, Chautauqua has nurtured the relationship of religion and life — worship, education and the arts. Continuing adult education, correspondence courses and a "great books" curriculum were all pioneered in Chautauqua. The Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle was the first "book club" in America (1878) and at one time sponsored 10,000 local reading circles in towns throughout the country.

By the 1880s Chautauqua was recognized as a national forum for the discussion of ideas in politics, economics, international relations, literature and science as well as religion. The performing arts became equally important in the Chautauqua program with a full orchestra season beginning in 1919 and opera and theatre since the 1930s.

The precedents of Chautauqua are found in the early nineteenth century and include the 'great revivals'—camp meetings attended by many thousands of people—but its overwhelming and lasting success must be laid to its unique combination of religion and education.

That Chautauqua was "an idea whose time had come" is shown by its rapid spread; hundreds of "Chautauquas" sprang up across the country—in Illinois alone there were over thirty by 1910. Near the turn of the century tent shows featuring "inspirational" lectures, dramatic readings and musical acts, criss-crossed the country playing the "Chautauqua circuit", as well as in small rural towns. A glance at some early programs of a typical Chautauqua season reveals a strange mixture of vaudeville, ballyhoo, Victorian moralism and Culture with a capital 'C'.

New Piasa Chautauqua

In 1885, eleven years after the founding of the first Chautauqua, two groups of Methodist ministers and laymen chartered a steamer in Alton and set off up river to find a suitable spot for a Summer Assembly. They came ashore at a spot known as Babb's Hollow and, finding in the eastern branch a wide valley with a free flowing spring, they made their decision. While negotiating for the purchase of the land, they issued a circular on July 13, announcing the first camp meeting of the Piasa Bluffs Assembly, to be held starting August 25, 1885, and continuing for one week. The circular declared: "The object of the Chautauqua Assembly is to maintain a summer resort for literary, scientific and religious instructions." That summer a large crowd with people from as far away as Springfield gathered to hear sermons by famous ministers.

Although tents continued to be used for many years, the change from camp ground to permanent resort began almost immediately, with the building in 1886 of the first cottage for the superintendent, D. D. Fry. By 1913, there were over 120 cottages, and the Chautauqua Springs Hotel (built by 1896) and the Chautauqua Inn (1903) provided accommodations for overnight visitors.

Like other Chautauquas, the Piasa Bluffs Assembly flourished in the decades around the turn of the century. Besides recreation and entertainment, many thousands of people thronged the grounds to hear such famous orators as William Jennings Bryan. But, like other Chautauquas, this one too felt the pinch of social changes in the twentieth century. Finally in 1921, the lecture series was abolished altogether and Chautauqua continued to be operated as a resort, although still preserving religious observance in Sunday and midweek worship services.

The Future

New Piasa Chautauqua is entering perhaps the most critical era of its ninety-one year history as we prepare for the re-organization of the corporation in 1985 and this year's program demonstrates a new commitment to the original purposes of Chautauqua — religion and education as a means of enriching life. Our Resident Minister will be devoting his full time to pastoral duties and all other aspects of the program will be under the supervision of our new Resident Program Director. Our recommitment, this summer, to our Chautauqua heritage of education and the arts, as well as an expansion of religious instruction, coincides appropriately with the celebration of our country's Bicentennial.

Special Notes and Comments

Please read the rules section at the back of the Program Book.

For the benefit of new owners — The bell at the Administration Building normally is sounded ½ hour before all events, and again at event time. The siren is blown at noon, 5:00 p.m. and in case of emergency. Religious and card party announcements, and movie reviews can be found on the bulletin boards near the Administration Building.

Some special safety and courtesy regulations:

Digging — There are underground telephone cables, gas, water, and sewer lines at Chautauqua. Please find the location of these before doing any digging. In the case of gas lines, these are made of plastic pipe and could easily be broken. There is a warning tape just below the ground at the gas line locations. **IF YOU SHOULD DIG UP THIS WARNING TAPE, DO NOT DIG ANY DEEPER!**

Bluff Climbing — The Spring area is an enticing but dangerous place for the children. **PLEASE RESTRAIN ANY CHILDREN FROM CLIMBING THE BLUFFS IN THIS AREA.**

Restraining Children — While Chautauqua is a place where children have freedom of the grounds, parents should restrain them from play activities during religious services, and also from annoying activities at the movies.

Dances — This year we are inviting all Chautauquans to attend all dances until the first intermission, at which time children under 13 years of age are requested to leave. This does not apply to the dance on Children's Day.

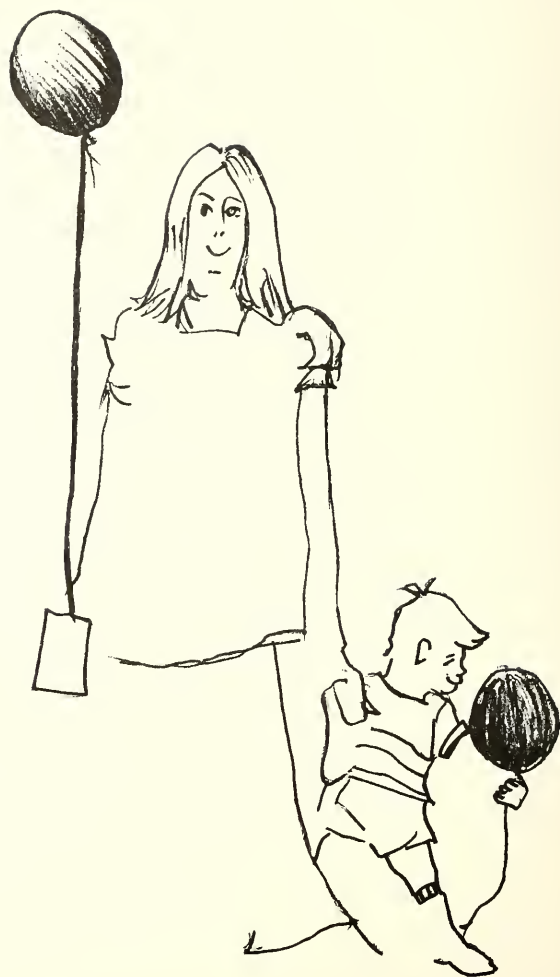
Entrance

Seminars for Christian Living

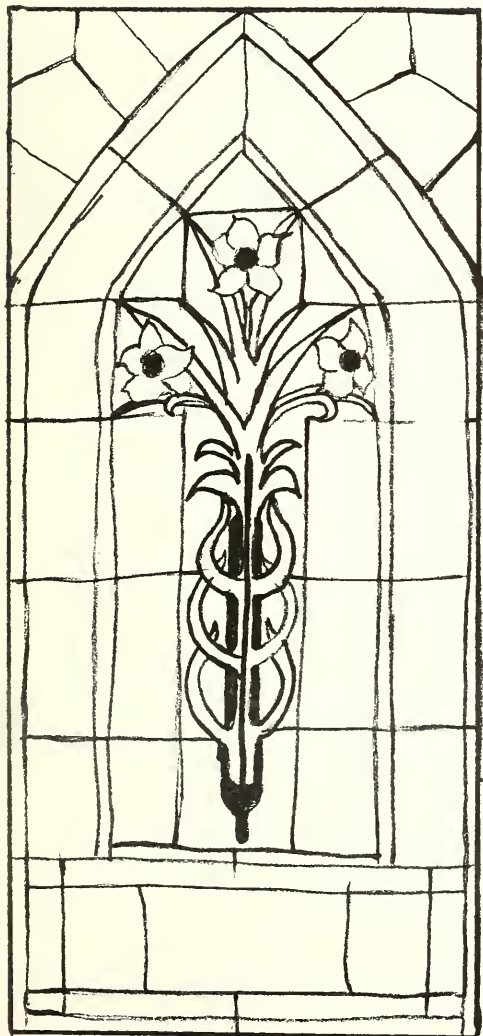

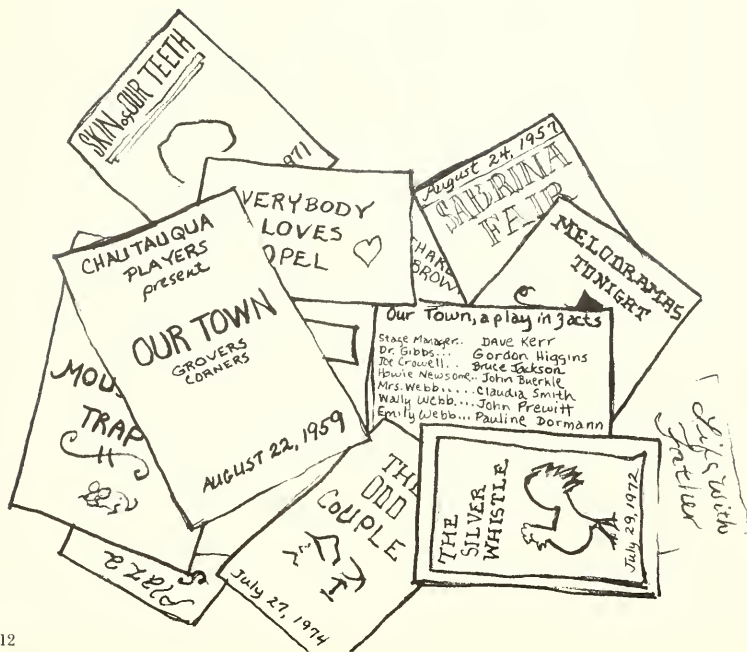

Self-discovery and the development of perseverance through the confrontation of physical and psychological challenges in a wilderness setting.

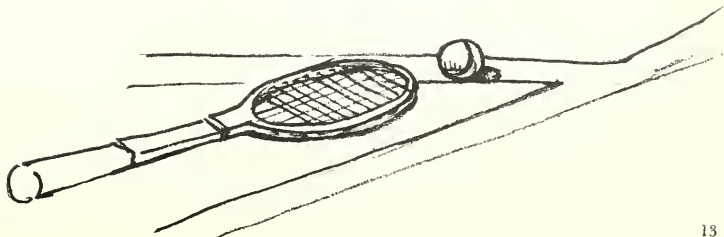
Program Director

By-Laws

Article II Object and Purpose

Section 1. Object. The object for which the association was formed as stated in its certificate of incorporation is: "To conduct a Chautauqua Assembly for religious, educational and scientific purposes and operate in connection therewith a summer resort."

Section 2. Policies. In fulfillment of this purpose, the association has since its organization found it feasible and possible to operate successfully without profit to its shareholders, to maintain well attended religious services and classes, to provide a place, facilities, and supervision for wholesome recreation and restful living during the summer season, and does hereby declare and determine that a continuation of such policies is for the best interest of the association, is essential to the accomplishment of its objects and will most effectively contribute to the physical, moral and spiritual welfare of its shareholders, cottage members, their families and guests, accordingly.

Section 3. Non-Commercial. It is declared that it shall be the policy of the association to prevent Chautauqua from becoming a commercial or secular enterprise during the period of its commitments to its cottage members, expiring November 30, 1985.

Section 4. Not for profit. The association shall continue to be operated and conducted without profit to its shareholders, and the net income, if any, shall not be accumulated for, or be paid to, or inure to the benefit of its shareholders.

Section 5. Religion. The association shall continue to provide leadership and facilities for religious education and worship services. Christian but non-sectarian in character, as the underlying motif of the organization, and shall permit no sectarian or anti-Christian services or activities.

Section 6. Recreation and Retreat. The association shall, in connection with its religious program, provide facilities and leadership for children, and shall operate and conduct Chautauqua as a peaceful, wholesome, pleasant and safe place for rest and retreat from the pressures of modern living.

Section 7. Revocation or Amendment. This article shall be the central guide and control of the officers, directors and shareholders in all their actions and decisions, and shall not be revoked or amended except by a vote of not less than three-fourths of the entire board of directors and three-fourths of the shares of stock of the association, and then only after at least thirty-days notice by United States Mail, postage prepaid, to all officers, directors and shareholders, setting forth specifically and in detail the proposed resolution for revocation or amendment to be submitted for consideration.

Rules and Regulations Governing Chautauqua

Rules and Regulations governing daily living at Chautauqua are conceived in the interest of promoting public safety and making possible a pleasant and enjoyable stay for everyone. The cooperation of all persons in observing and obeying all By-Laws, Rules and Regulations of the Association at all times will be greatly appreciated.

1. VEHICLES: All automobiles must be brought to a full stop at the Gate House at entrance to the Chautauqua grounds upon entering or leaving. The Gatekeeper is required to determine that each person entering the grounds is properly authorized for admission.

The speed limit of all motor vehicles on the Chautauqua grounds is 15 miles per hour. All "Stop" signs must be obeyed.

No one may operate a motor vehicle on the Chautauqua grounds who does not possess a Driver's License of the state in which he resides and who is not adequately covered by liability insurance. All motor vehicles are required to have a state license.

All residents and guests are urged to leave cars parked and to walk when possible. The unnecessary driving of motor vehicles on Chautauqua grounds will not be permitted.

Anyone judged guilty of careless driving shall be prohibited from driving on Chautauqua grounds.

Bicycles are not to be ridden on public walks or the board walk. Bicycle riders are urged to exercise caution in riding their bicycles.

Motorcycles and minibikes are not allowed on grounds.

2. COTTAGE GUESTS: Owners wishing to have guests in their cottages must notify the office manager and submit complete information about prospective guests to the board. The board reserves the right to withhold approval on applications.

If you expect guests, notify the gatekeeper in advance and make arrangements for their admission. Failure to make advance arrangements can cause embarrassment since the gatekeeper is not authorized to admit strangers to the grounds simply because they announce they have come to visit a Chautauqua resident.

3. BUILDING: No building or additions shall be erected, nor repair work started except with the consent of the Board of Directors, under a permit signed by the Secretary. No building or additions shall be done from June 15th to September 10th.

Any cottage owner who intends to install an air-conditioner, electric stove, electric hot water heater, or any other electrical appliance that consumes a large amount of current must first obtain approval of the Board of Directors.

4. COTTAGES: The Grounds Committee shall have the authority to examine or inspect any cottage or place on the Grounds as to fire hazards, water, light and sanitary conditions at any reasonable time.

5. ANIMALS: Dogs or cats shall not be allowed on the streets or public grounds of this Association unless leashed.

6. OPEN FIRES: Burning of trash or other open fires are not permitted on the grounds at any time except by paid employees of the Association.

7. NOISES: Loud playing of musical instruments, radios and televisions is not permitted. Quiet hour shall be observed at 11 p.m. on week nights except Friday which will be 12 p.m. and 12:30 a.m. on Saturday nights.

8. CURFEW: Curfew hours are the same as quiet hours. All children under 18 years of age shall be in their cottages at Curfew.

9. GAMES: Use of courts or playing out-of-doors games is prohibited from 11 p.m. on Saturday to 12 o'clock noon Sunday. All outdoor games are restricted daily between the hours from 11 p.m. and 8 a.m.

10. INTOXICATING LIQUORS: The consumption of beer or intoxicating liquors shall not be permitted at any time on public grounds of Chautauqua.

11. POSTERS: No posters, hand bills, signs, or pictures shall be displayed on the grounds except on the Bulletin Board, and with the permission of the president. Approved Chautauqua organizations may obtain permission to advertise special events by referring request to office manager at the Administration Building.

12. GARBAGE AND TRASH: Garbage and trash shall be placed in covered containers. It will be collected at regular intervals during the season. Papers and trash should be deposited in containers which are provided for this purpose around the grounds.

13. GUNS AND FIREARMS: It is against our rules to hunt or to discharge fire arms at any time or place on Chautauqua property. This also applies to air guns or air rifles.

The discharge of fire works, fire crackers or bombs of any type is not permitted at Chautauqua at any time.

The Board (Management) reserves the right to expel from the Grounds, or to refuse admission to anyone not conforming to these rules and regulations.
